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Big Fundraising Success For Barack Obama

Close to 60 people attended a late afternoon cocktail party at Eddie's Restaurant as a fundraiser for Barack Obama, a front-runner for the Democratic nomination in the US presidential elections in 2008. The idea came from two big fans of the senator from Illinois: Boston lawyer Richard Branson and Lucy Salenger, who lives in Chicago near Senator Obama. Together, and during the vacation they enjoy every year in Saint Barth, they decided just two weeks ago to organize this

cocktail party in support of Obama's campaign for the Democratic nomination—a campaign which continues to grow stronger and which faces a major hurdle on March 4 when the primaries in Texas and Ohio take place.

Coordinator of the event, Richard Branson quickly gave the floor to Lucy Salenger, who confirmed her thoughts about her neighbor: "He's outside, what he is inside." Next to speak was Gene Robinson, a reverend from New Hampshire, who spoke

about his personal contact with Obama and the impression that the senator left after discussions that the two men had together: "He has the capacity for true change, to break with the current political game that leaves 49% of the population on the sidelines in order to serve the other 51%," confirms Robinson. He then proposed that each person present donate half of the cost of a week's rental in Saint Barth. Next up was the principal speaker, Marvin Zonis, professor of international political economy and

leadership the University of Chicago. He spoke on the theme of "Leadership and Barack Obama." A fervent supporter of the candidate, the professor explained to those present what he understood leadership to be, and how Obama appeared to be the best candidate to deal with the many challenges facing the United States—both inside and outside of its borders.

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
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Gustavia: A Historic Architectural Promenade

Sneak preview at the Swedish Design Center

Last Saturday, Jenny Stening revealed the design of a handsome book that will be published this summer, and which is dedicated to the Swedish buildings in Gustavia. Entitled "Gustavia: A Historic Architectural Promenade," the book was presented at the Swedish Design Center, a local showcase for Swedish design, which will distribute the book. Edited in three languages—French, Swedish, English—the book is presented as an architectural and historic guide to colonial Gustavia, focusing on the period from 1785 to 1878 when the Swedish flag flew on the island. "It was during this



period that Gustavia was built and took on the form it still has today," notes the author, who is also an architect and is known on the island for the Swedish walking tour she developed in 2004 for the former municipality and which

resulted in the book. Per Tingbrand, the retired Swedish lawyer, considered the most important historian when it comes to the Swedish past of Saint Barth, and Arlette Magras, a local historian, have both read the profs. The book, expected to be available next summer, most likely in August, contains 120 pages illustrated with plans and designs

from the archives in Sweden and in Saint Barth, as well as photos that the author has taken since 1994, the year that she came to Saint Barth for the first time, after a transatlantic sailing trip with her family. How did she develop this serious interest in Gustavia? "This is one of the rare colonial cities built by Sweden. As a Swede and also an architect, I had to have been interested," says Stening, whose architectural thesis in 2001 was on the former town hall—a building from the Swedish era in Saint Barth.

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MARTINE LAINÉ "PATCHWORK" THROUGH MARCH 2

Artist Martine Lainé not only paints, she also does patchwork. Her textiles are on exhibit at Météo France, near the lighthouse above Gustavia, through March 2. Lainé organized the first exhibit of patchwork in Guadeloupe and began teaching this artform, while also successfully participating in national and international competitions. In 1996, she participated in the finals of the International Quilt Festival in Houston,



Texas, and in 1999, she created a patchwork for Christian Lacroix. In 2000 she took part in the International Patchwork Competition of Chartres, followed by the International Quilt Festival of Tokyo in 2003, before entering a competition at the lace museum in Retournac.

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Douchy, The Doyenne of Overseas France

Eugénie Blanchard, known by the nickname "Douchy," celebrated her birthday on Saturday, February 16. At age 112, she became the oldest woman in Overseas France, and second oldest woman in all of France. For the occasion, a reception was held in her honor on the patio of the De Bruyn Hospital in Gustavia, where she has lived since 1980.

For those who do not know her, Eugénie Blanchard was born on February 16, 1896 in the Merlet neighborhood of Saint Barth. She took the name Sister Cyria Costa when she entered a convent in Curaçao. It is said that her

nickname, "Douchy," comes from a childhood deformation of the word "ducle" or sweet in Spanish Exiled for 33 in the capital of the Dutch Antilles, Douchy returned to Saint Barth for the first time at the age of 60. She lived in the family house in Merlet until she was 84, but almost blind she moved to the hospital in 1980 and has lived there ever since. She does not hear or see very well, but still speaks a little. She does not receive any medical treatment, and is the last of her 12 brothers and sisters to survive. She does not have any direct descendants, but quite a few relatives come to see her regularly.

Culprit Faces Court Date For Throwing Waste Water In Harbor

The captain of the boat, Balaju, which is regularly anchored at the Quai Général de Gaulle, will appear in police court during its next session. 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The St Barth Film Festival Takes To The Road

“If you can’t go to the cinema, the cinema will come to you.” In keeping with this slogan from Ciné Woulé, the organizers of the Saint Barth Film Festival plan to show some of their films and videos in one or two different neighborhoods of the island during the 13th annual festival, which takes place April 25-30, 2008. The locations and program have not yet been decided, but the idea was finalized during the recent visit of Jean-Marc Césaire, who came to Saint Barth at the invitation of the organizers, Ellen Lampert-Gréaux, Rosemond Gréaux, and Joshua Harri-

son. Césaire is the founder of the association, Ciné Woulé, which has traveled from town to town in

Guadeloupe projecting 35 films as well as videos on inflatable screens since 1995. Jean-Marc will

films and allow us to share the costs,” he explains. His dream is that each French-speaking Caribbean island, including Saint Barth, be part of this network. “Itinerant projections are a good way to attract people who would never go to the movies otherwise,” he adds.

The organizers of the St Barth Film Festival are also collaborating with Ciné Woulé as a means to project videos in large format and good technical conditions, something that has been difficult in the past. “The projections of the video, *Memories Of Our Past*, last year illustrated the limited technical means we have to project videos,” says Lampert-Gréaux. “Ciné Woulé, which has many different projectors as well as inflatable and transportable screens, can really help,” she adds, not hiding a desire to add new spectators after slightly lower attendance at the festival in the last two years.

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
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


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January Weather Report:

Normal Temperatures, More Rain

René Fury, responsible for Météo France in Guadeloupe, reports on the weather conditions for January 2008.

31. The ocean temperature was near 78.8°F, average for the season.

Air

In janvier, the air was a bit dryer than usual. The average level of humidity for the month was 72.4%, compared to 73.6% which is the usual average for the month of January.

Wind

Quite frequently blowing from the northeast, the wind was often strong during January with gusts reaching 45 mph on January 31.

Forecast

Seasonal forecasts for the months of March, April and May call for slightly cooler than average temperatures. And higher levels of rain are also expected. The forecast for the hurricane season indicates a high level of activity, as in recent years.



Rain

With 3.4" of rain, the month of January 2008 was considered rather wet in contrast to seasonal averages. Yet it remains below the record rainfall of 5" in 1975. February is following in the same vein, with 1.9", which is a lot for a month usually considered dry, but far from the record 6.1" that fell in 1989.



Temperatures

The average temperature for the month was 74.3°F and considered normal. The lowest temperature for the month was 69.6°F, while the hottest daytime temperature was a bit lower than normal at 78.9°F on January

Out of service since August 2006, the Rapid Explorer ferry started up again on February 19, under new management, Om Express, and with a new port of embarkation. They used to leave from Philipsburg, but the new route for Saint-Martin-Saint-Barth is now from Oyster Pond, twice a day,

seven days a week. For the time being, the 40 to 45 minute trip is made by just one boat, Sea Shuttle, which can carry 90 passengers. "There might be a second boat in the future, but for now we are focusing on the comfort of the passengers," notes Raymond Kalley of OM Express, who hopes to get some of the airline clients, rather than pull from the clientele of the Voyager ferries. "There are a lot of passengers in transit to Saint Barth who do not like small planes and the landing in Saint Barth. For them, the comfort of a boat is very important and that is why we offer real seats, an air-conditioned cabin, and a video system is in the works," he says. OM Express also set their timetable in conjunction

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
