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Armed Thief Sentenced To 18 Months In Prison

The armed thief who held up the cashier at the Oasis supermarket and was also suspected of three other thefts and an attempted robbery was brought before the judge in Basse-Terre on Tuesday afternoon at which time he was condemned to a 18 months in prison, with at least two months behind bars and a suspended sentence of two years. He was immediately incarcerated. This 29 year-old man—originally from metropolitan France—was already known to the gendarmes, who arrested him on Sunday morning. His chronic state of drug addiction influenced his behavior.

He had begun a series of robberies on the night of February 28-29, by throwing a rock through the window of a beauty parlor in the shopping center, La Savane, across from the airport. He illegally entered and stole cash. He then tried unsuccessfully to break into the boutique, Danièle B Diffusion, before heading to the Vaval shopping center in Saint Jean. He used the same technique—a rock through the window—to get into the toy store, Un dimanche à la mer, once again taking the cash, before doing the same at another boutique, Couleurs de Provence, where he took not only money but also several sets of

knives. End of the first act. The perpetrator reappeared at lunchtime, a motorcycle helmet on his head, at the Oasis supermarket in Lorient. He confronted the cashier, who was alone at the time, and menaced her with a knife, asking for the money in the cash register. The cashier, who was in a state of shock, gave it to him: net result of 1,470 euros. The perpetrator was quickly identified and picked up on Sunday morning but the stolen money was not recovered. Under police surveillance, he admitted to another theft during the night of February 22 at the Garage de l'Etoile, where 50 euros and a printer were taken.

This was not the first time an armed robbery took place in Saint Barth, yet this kind of crime remains extremely rare. The last incident dates back to December 1995, when two men wearing full-face helmets held up the small post office in Lorient while it was closed for lunch. Brandishing their guns, they menaced the postal employee who was inside. They took the cash and fled on a motorcycle. They two men were later caught by the police in metropolitan France, and sentenced to three years in prison although two of three years were a suspended sentence.

580,000 Euros In Tourist Taxes In January

BRUNO MAGRAS CRITICIZES SOME WHO RENT DIRECTLY TO CLIENTS

Enacted as of January 1, 2008, a new tourist tax of 5% of all seasonal rentals brought in the sum of 580,000 for the month of January. This figure is lower than the expectations of the COM, whose president, Bruno Magras, points a finger at those who rent certain villas: "The hotels proceeded to declare and collect the tax, as did the 28 agencies that rent villas and apartments," explains Bruno Magras. But he feels that there are certain villa owners who rent directly to their clients via the Internet and who think they are exonerated from declaring their rentals and paying the tax. It is those owners that Bruno Magras will not excuse or offer favors: "We are currently doing research to identify these people. They will be taxed appropriately," notes Magras, who was to meet with Bernard Cressot, the general treasurer, on Tuesday, March 4, to discuss the procedure to collect the taxes. For the president, the desire to collect these taxes is not out of the norm: "It is to be expected. We need these taxes in order to meet the budget for the COM. It is in the interest of everybody on the island, since the more we can collect, the less risk there is of creating new taxes."

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The Changing Climate

What are the consequences for the Caribbean?

René Fury is the head of Météo France, the French weather service in Guadeloupe de. Throughout his career, he has been interested in the climatic changes and greenhouse effect. For the readers of the Saint Barth Weekly, he examines the question of climate changes in the Caribbean and in Saint Barth.

“During the 1980s scientists began talking about the changes in the climate. At the time, they forecast an increase in temperatures by three degrees by the year 2100, but certain models call for an increase of at least six degrees, if not eight. But we didn’t dare believe it... three degrees would already be an incredible catastrophe.

Today, if the entire scientific community openly recognizes the dangers of climate change, there are different theories, based on various models of evolution. The differences are less due to the uncertainty of the models, but rather to the scenarios that man opts to follow. That means that an increase of three degrees would result only from a rigorous scenario limited greenhouse gas emissions. The six-degree increase would result from a less rigorous scenario.

What are the consequences for the Caribbean?

In the Caribbean, climate change has been marked by a change in temperature that is less than the global average, and not much of a change in rainfall; nor has there has not been

a major change in the level of hurricane activity. One change however is the intensity of the hurricanes that take place and the amounts of rainfall during a fierce storm.

At first glance, changes in global climate do not seem to be causing major consequences on a regional level. Perhaps an increase of two degrees in temperatures would make it a little harder to support the heat in August, September, and October. Economically, things are different: the global increase in temperatures will in effect multiply the number of zones that have tropical climates, and are competitive in terms of tourism, at higher latitudes ...

But for the Caribbean and Saint Barth in particular, the largest danger would be an overall increase in sea level, due to global warming. This increase is essentially due to two phenomena: thermal expansion of seawater and widespread melting of land ice (glaciers). A few years ago, in 2001 to be exact, Météo-France participated in a simulation of the melting of the large polar ice floes. The model called for complete melting by the end of the 21st century. However they have found that the acceleration of this melting in 2007 was much faster than they anticipated. The consequence is that if this speed continues, the ice floes will no longer exist as early as 2070! Yet even the melting of all this ice would not cause an increase in sea level, as the mass of this floating ice is already taken into consideration.

But the rate at which the floes are melting is an excellent indicator that

corresponds to the melting of the glaciers of Greenland, or North America, and the Antarctic. The total volume of these continental glaciers—more than 20 million cubic miles—is enormous, and if it were all to melt, the millions of cubic miles of ice would raise sea level by 275 feet!

Yet this will not happen tomorrow: at the current rate, it would take at least 500 years before this catastrophic scenario would take place.

In Saint Barth?

Armed with this information, what are the possible consequences for Saint Barth? If what they predict is true, one can imagine that by 2050, with an average temperature a few degrees hotter, that the level of the ocean would increase by approximately one foot as a direct consequence. To that, one must add the increase due to melting snows, approximately one-half inch per year, or an additional 1.3 feet. Or by 2050, sea level might increase in Saint Barth by 2.3 feet. What happens to buildings along the beach, and also to the port?

In conclusion, one can say that as the climate continues to change and reveal more surprises, whether one is an optimist, pessimist or fatalist, the rise of sea level is certitude. And if the increase in the water level by 2050 is five inches or thirty-five inches, the changes in the climate will have importance consequences that touch every person and every region in the world.

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Campaign SightFirst II

The Lions Club of Saint-Barth, The Most Generous In The Caribbean and Central and South America

Since the kick-off of the project in July 2005, the Lions Club of Saint Barth has donated \$54,000 to the International Lion's Club Foundation for its Sight-First II campaign. The size of the donation makes the club the top donor throughout the entire Caribbean zone, as well as Central and South America, as we were told recently by the local club. This also makes it the most important activity of the club, especially for president Agnes Houchot (2007-2008), who thanks the population, both residents and visitors, for their generosity.

After a first campaign in the 1990s, the goal of First-Sight II, which ends this year during the annual convention of the service club in Bangkok, Thailand, was to fight against loss of sight through cataracts, river blindness, and trachoma, the leading cause of preventable blindness. The Lions Club hoped to collect 150 million dollars through the actions of 46,000 local clubs throughout the world. According to the Lions Club, the SightFirst I campaign helped seven million people recover their sight, and up to 20 million others avoid serious loss of vision.

Let's Hear It For The Environment:

Miles electric cars arrive in Saint Barth



At a time when Europe is just discovering electric cars, Auto Store Import is already bringing Miles electric cars to Saint Barth. Miles is a California company—based in Santa Monica—which was recognized as “the electric car company of the year” in 2007. For the time being they are producing four models: three small urban vehicles, the ZX40, the ZX40S, and the ZX40AD, plus a small utility vehicle—and they vary in price upon delivery in Saint Barth from \$19,500 to \$24,500. By the end of the year there should also be a higher speed sedan, and all five models are available in Saint Barth after a six-week wait. This pro-environmental effort was the idea of Thierry Besse, who currently lives in Miami, and Alpha Delamotte, manager of Auto Store Import. The former, Thierry Besse, is a specialist in American automobile imports, and the latter is a mechanic and fervent defender of the environment; they quickly realized that there is a bright future for cars that cause

less pollution. The project got underway a little over a year ago and took root last November when Thierry Besse, seeking a rare pearl, discovered the Miles cars at an electric car show in California. It didn't take much to convince the two men to start importing these closed cars with real metal bodies designed to look like regular cars, and enough power to climb the island's steep hills. Here's the real deal: the existing models have enough autonomy to go about 50 miles at a top speed of 40 mph. It takes four to six hours to recharge the car using any electric outlet, at a cost of just one euro for the power it takes to drive 50 miles. The six batteries that comprise the motors of these cars have an expected life span of four years or 30,000 miles. After that they must be replaced at a cost of \$350 per battery. Maintenance includes changing the automatic transmission oil every 4,000 miles. Other than replacing worn-out parts (brake pads, windshield wipers...) that's about it.

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FREESTYLE "BOWL IN SAINT-JEAN
