



# Vignettes Now On Sale

As of Monday, January 12, three people working for the Collectivity began to sell the 2009 vehicle vignettes in a temporary office—an annex to the territorial treasurer—in the parking lot of the stadium in St. Jean. This was an idea proposed by executive council member Maxime Desouches, in order to avoid the congestion that took place in Gustavia during the final days that the vignettes were on sale last year. The sale of the vignettes will also be handled differently this year as well: to avoid long lines in the offices, all those who have car rental agencies, own a fleet of more than 10 vehicles, or need special handicap access, must make an appointment.

By noon on Tuesday, 135 vignettes had already been purchased since they went on sale on Monday. A good start for the sales, whose number can be obtained at any point in time thanks to a new computerized system based in real time, allowing the collection agents access to the database.

As a reminder, in 2008, 2008, 8,034 vignettes were sold for the overall sum of a little more than 1.3 million Euros. The Collectivity is counting on the sale of almost 10,000 vignettes in 2009, based on the more than 1,000 new vehicles registered in the past year. Vignettes must be purchased by March 31. After that date, a fine of 80% will be added to the tax.

# Dengue: Danger Of An Epidemic

Anti-mosquito pulverizations continue on the island, in the hope of reducing the number of mosquitoes, yet there is still evidence of the dengue epidemic that began three months ago. During the first week of January, there have been 24 new cases that are almost certainly the disease and seven cases that have been tested to absolutely be dengue, which means a total of 333 people have been touched by the virus, or almost 4% of the population. During the first week of January, an adult with a mild version of Dengue Hemorrhagic Fever was hospitalized, bringing the number of people hospitalized since the beginning of the epidemic to 12: nine adults, of which five had severe cases and one with the hemorrhagic version, and three children with milder cases. The level of severity of the disease in Saint Barth is 2.4%, compared to 0.38% currently in Saint Martin, and 0.8% in Guadeloupe during the epidemic of 2007, adds to the disturbing news about dengue fever, and demands a major mobilization by the population to stop this phenomenon.

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# 25th Annual Music Festival Off To A Rousing Start

It's hard to imagine how great the music at the St Barth Music Festival really is! Once again some of the world's top musicians have gathered on the island for a series of concerts in the island's churches, and outdoors at AJOE, where the John Ellis Jazz Sextet played its second concert last Saturday night. Ellis and a stellar group of musicians—his band Double Wide and friends (or Triple Wide as he joked at the opening concert last Thursday at the Catholic Church in Gustavia)—put on one heck of a show. With Ellis on saxophone, Alan Ferber on trombone, Aaron Goldberg tickling the ivories, Matt Perrine on tuba (or is that a sousaphone? Why, yes it is!), Gregoire Maret on harmonica, and Jason Marsalis, cool as a cucumber on drums, you can't ask for a better jazz band. With influences from New Orleans, as well as church-inspired music, and a few songs by Fred Rogers of Mister Rogers' Neighborhood fame (the popular kids' TV show), the repertoire was varied and allowed the musicians to excel (some of the harmonica solos were real killers). At the AJOE concert, the band marched through the audience in true New Orleans fashion, much to the delight of the crowd. Just as the name Marsalis is synonymous with great jazz, John Ellis and his band did not disappoint in any way... they were simply great!

On a different note, Friday night's concert was a true virtuoso tour de force by Jon Manasse on clarinet and Jon Nakamatsu on piano. After the "two Jons" displayed their joint talents on works by Carl Maria von Weber and Frederic Chopin, Jon Nakamatsu performed Bela Kovac's Hommage A Manuel de Falla, as an incredible piano solo. The concert concluded with Four Rags For Two Jons, a series of short jazzy numbers written for them by John Novacek. The rags were a fun way to end their

concert... although they were called back for an encore and played George Gershwin's Fascinating Rhythm. Sunday afternoon, the students of Saint Barth Harmony Suzuki School, under the tutelage of music teacher Gatien Vilain, performed at the Anglican Church. And who knows, maybe a local student will follow in the footsteps of the soloists in the festival orchestra some day? Week two of the music festival is more serious with evenings dedicated

to Bach and Mozart, as well as an orchestral evening and the popular opera evening, this year featuring Puccini's Madame Butterfly on Friday, January 15. The Bach evening featured the local choir, Le Chorale des Bons Choeurs, under the direction of Charles Darden, in two chorale works. But the real highlights of the evening were a bassoon solo by the world-famous Alex Klein, who joked that the suite he played was written for unaccompanied cello but since Bach's original notes have never been found, one can imagine it was written for the bass oboe he was playing. "This instrument was invented in the last 19th century and fell immediately into abandonment," he said with a laugh. "It is enjoying a comeback... as of tonight." He proved his world status with a flawless performance of the lively yet emotional and technical music. The 25th annual festival concludes with a fund-raising dinner at Eddy's Restaurant on Sunday, January 18, and a final concert on Monday, January 19, with the celebrated Miro string quartet playing works by Charles Ives, Kevin Puts, and Antonin Dvorak.

# Music Festival: A Touch of the Caribbean For New Orleans Jazz

In celebration of the 25th anniversary of the St Barth Music Festival, students at the Mireille Choisy junior high school had the opportunity to meet sousaphone player Matt Perrine during their music class.

Born in California, this jazz aficionado quickly moved to New Orleans to hone his chops. He came to the school with his sousaphone, a variation on the tuba invented by composer John Phillip Sousa, who originally wanted a tuba with a mellower sound for concerts, but it developed into a staple for marching bands and jazz funerals. Today it is also a popular instrument heard in the music clubs of New Orleans.

Matt Perrine's presentation was full of humor as he initiated the students to his music, and offered some of them the chance to try to play the sousaphone, much to their amusement.

He also took advantage of the opportunity to speak to



the students about hurricane Katrina and the disastrous consequences it had on the city of New Orleans, where almost 80% of the population lost everything. Matt Perrine began to play the sousaphone, as well as the double bass and electric bass, at the age of 12, the same age as his student audience. His multiple musical talents allow him to play many musical styles, from reggae and jazz, to African and Cuban music as well.

He often accompanies such New Orleans greats as Bonerama or Royal Finger-

bowl, but it was with the John Ellis jazz band that he made his debut at the St Barth Music Festival, which continues through January 19.

# BRIAN LEWIS



Among the outstanding world-class musicians who come to the island every January for the Saint Barth Music Festival is Brian Lewis, a 40 year-old violin virtuoso who has been performing here for at least the past 15 years. He originally met festival organizer, Frances Debroff, through his mentor Charles Stegeman: "He was one of my mentors musically," notes Lewis, who met Stegeman in Kansas City, MO. "He advised me about going to Juilliard, which teacher to audition for, and which path to take." In Saint Barth, they play side by side in the festival orchestra, with Lewis and Stegeman serving as concertmaster for the

orchestral evening and the opera evening, respectively. At the Juilliard School of music in New York City, Lewis currently serves as artistic director of the Starling violin program. "We have visiting teachers for master classes including Itzhak Perlman and David Kim, concertmaster for the Philadelphia Orchestra," says Lewis. "The Starling Foundation underwrites the tuition for 12 students up to age 25." In addition to his duties at Juilliard, Lewis is also the David and Mary Winton Green Chair Fellow in String Performance and Pedagogy at The University of Texas at Austin. "I love Austin," he says. "It is a

very hip, liberal city to live in." Now called the Butler School of Music, thanks to a 55-million dollar donation from the Butler Family, the school of music in Austin provided an unusual opportunity for Lewis: to hold an endowed chair by the age of 32 was a real blessing." Coming back to Saint Barth every year "is like getting together with an extended family and playing music with your friends for very appreciative audiences. And playing it in paradise makes it all the sweeter," says Lewis, who appeared in a concert of music by Bach, as well as the orchestral and opera evenings. He starred in Bach's Double Violin Concerto in D Minor, playing with Daniel Ching, a member of the Miro Quartet, and a string section of nine players. "We only had rehearsal together," says Lewis about the Bach, which they played without a conductor. But he adds, "the first time I played this piece

I was seven, and Daniel must know it well also. It's a great learning piece and one of the greatest double concertos ever written." And when musicians of this caliber get together, one rehearsal is clearly enough for stellar results. "The most challenging piece we played this year is the Tchaikovsky Symphony Number 4 in F minor, opus 36, and James Stephenson composed a world premiere in honor of the 25th anniversary of the festival," Lewis points out. But even such challenging music doesn't daunt the Lewis or the other members of the festival orchestra, which comes together just once a year for the concerts on the island. "That's part of the excitement of coming here," says Lewis. "The musicians are principal players from all over the world. It's a special festival and a very special orchestra."



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# New Boats For The Saint Barth Yacht Club



Since the beginning of the school year, the Saint Barth Yacht Club (SBYC) has replaced its old fleet with 12 new Vanguard RS FEVA sailboats, designed primarily for sailing schools. The new boats were anxiously awaited for some time, but lack of financing delayed their purchase. During the 2008 edition of the Saint Barth



Bucket, race organizers Hank Halsted and Melanie Smith, put the SBYC in contact with Camper & Nicholson's. This international yacht brokerage firm, which would like to establish a beachhead on the island, financed the

purchase of the 12 new boats, which were first used by elementary school students in the fall, and since January by students from the junior high. The boats are in constant use with the three elementary schools and the junior

high taking turns at the tiller all week, much to the joy of the students. But the SBYC also continues its yacht club activities on Wednesdays and Saturdays, with 25 children enrolled for classes. Last November, kids from the club partici-

ipated in a regatta in Saint Martin, which included competitors from Anguilla, Saint Martin, and Saint Barth.

Last fall also saw the arrival of two new sailing instructors, Brendan and Nicolas, two young men from Brittany who are sharing their passion for sailing with the island's students. In addition, the SBYC continues to host internal competitions and has future plans including a project to bring young American students from poor neighborhoods to learn to sail on the island. This project might also be financing in part by Camper & Nicholson's.

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# DENGUE: PROTECT YOURSELF TO STOP ITS PROLIFERATION

This informational notice is the result of a private initiative by two American residents who are greatly concerned about the ongoing instance of dengue fever on the island. The information was gathered with the help of Dr. Gilles Alayrangues, an emergency room doctor at the Hospital de Bruyn, in conjunction with scientist Deborah Brosnan and David Graham of the Saint Barth International Property Owners Association. Photocopies have been widely distributed since the end of 2008 in various locations on the island.

Dengue fever is prevalent throughout the Caribbean, including St Barthelemy. Although the island is fully mobilized in controlling dengue, you too can take precautions to protect yourself and help eradicate it. Most dengue cases are benign, but complications can develop. Seek medical help if you develop dengue fever.

## *What is dengue fever and how is it transmitted?*

Dengue fever is the most common mosquito-borne viral diseases in the world. Dengue fever is an illness caused by infection from a virus transmitted by the Aedes mosquito. There are four types of the infectious dengue virus (serotypes 1 to 4). Types 1, 2, and possibly 4 have been identified on St Barths. Infection with one strain will provide protection only against that particular strain. Future infection by other strains is possible. Dengue is transmitted to humans by a bite from an Aedes mosquito that carries the dengue virus. You cannot "catch" dengue from someone. Aedes aegypti, the dengue mosquito can bite all day, and takes only 10 days to complete its lifecycle.

## *How do I know if I have dengue?*

Symptoms usually appear between 3-10 days of being bitten. Dengue fever is characterized by the sudden onset of high fever, (which can last up to 7 days or more). It is often accompanied by one or more of the following symptoms: intense headache, back ache, body aches, joint pains, loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting and the development of skin rashes. The most severe form is known as haemorrhagic fever (which includes a tendency to bruise easily or other types of skin hemorrhages, bleeding nose or gums, and possibly internal bleeding). A blood test will often show low platelets. Patients with dengue fever often become dehydrated.

## *What should I do if I think I have dengue fever?*

Go to the local hospital or contact a local doctor. The Emergency Room at the hospital is fully prepared to deal with dengue. The doctors and medical staff on St Barths are experienced in dealing with dengue cases and can provide excellent care and advice. If you have left the island and suspect you have dengue then go to your

doctor at home as soon as possible and tell them that you may have been exposed to dengue fever.

## *What is the treatment ?*

There is no specific treatment for dengue or dengue haemorrhagic fever. Patients should rest, drink plenty of fluids. Pain relievers with acetaminophen are helpful but patients should avoid those containing aspirin. Consult a doctor. Supportive care with intravenous fluids and frequent blood test monitoring can reduce complications of the disease. In severe and haemorrhagic cases, blood transfusions may be required. Hospitalisation is recommended for patients who have severe symptoms, and for patients with signs (eg, low platelet counts) that may lead to haemorrhage (internal bleeding).

## *What precautions can I take?*

The best and only defense against dengue is to not get bitten by an infected mosquito. There is no vaccine or "cure". But you can take several steps to protect yourself.

Applying insect repellent is the way most people protect themselves against getting bitten. But it is not the only way to guard against mosquitoes; wearing long-sleeved clothing, using mosquito nets while sleeping and staying in mosquito-free rooms are good measures to prevent mosquito bites. Others include insecticide sprays and burning repellent oils. You should decide for yourselves on one or a combination of these.

Several insect repellents exist in the market with a suite of active ingredients of varying effectiveness, and that work differently on each individual. You can buy a range of insect repellent at supermarkets and pharmacies in St Barths. Some have natural or organic "bio" compounds and others contain commercial ingredients. DEET is the most common active ingredient in most commercial products. Most products contain DEET in concentration between 7% to 20%. But some contain 50% or even 100% DEET. Higher concentrations of DEET do not improve protection but do last longer in terms of protection. (On average, concentrations of 6% protects for about two hours, and 20% for about 4 hours.). If you are unsure of what products to get, talk to the pharmacists in St Barths who are knowledgeable about dengue.

## WHAT CAN I DO TO STOP MOSQUITOES FROM BREEDING AND HELP THE FIGHT AGAINST DENGUE?

**Alot!** The mosquitoes that cause dengue live close to houses and dwellings. That means that you can take steps to prevent mosquitoes from breeding around your property. Your actions will protect yourself and your family. All the Time

- Don't allow stagnant water. Turn pails and watering cans over and store them under shelter.
- Remove water in plant pot plates. Clean and scrub the plate thoroughly to remove mosquito eggs. Avoid the use of plant pot plates, if possible.
- Loosen soil from potted plants to prevent the accumulation of stagnant water on the surface of the hardened soil.
- Do not block the flow of water in drains. Cover rarely used gully traps. Replace the gully trap with non-perforated ones and install anti-mosquito valves.
- No trays or receptacles should be placed beneath and and/or on top of any air-conditioning unit so as not to create a condition favourable for mosquito breeding.

### Every other day

- Change water in flower vases. Clean and scrub the inner sides of vases. Wash roots of flowers and plants thoroughly as mosquito eggs can stick to them easily.

### Weekly

- Clear fallen leaves and stagnant water in your drains and garden. These leaves could collect water or cause blockages to the drains, thus resulting in the buildup of stagnant water.
- Clear any stagnant water in your air cooler unit.

### Monthly

- Add prescribed amounts of sand granular insecticide into vases, gully traps and roof gutters, even if they are dry. A tablespoon of oil (any oil e.g. cooking oil) added to water will kill larvae.
- Clear away fallen leaves in roof gutters and apron drains. If structurally feasible, remove the roof gutters.
