# WIND IN THEIR SAILS

This year, Les Voiles de Saint-Barth hopes to confirm its reputation as a world-class regatta.

skipper Ken Read, who participated in the first two editions of Les Voiles.

The success of the first two years has sharpened the expectations of skippers and owners from around the world. Peter Holmberg, Olympic medalist, specialist of Match Racing, and Americas Cup skipper, is from the Virgin Islands. He and his friends from the Caribbean Sailing Association are good ambassadors for Les Voiles, placing it alongside the RORC 600 in Antigua and the Heineken Regatta in nearby Saint Martin, as one of the top Caribbean races. And the waters around Saint Barthélemy are a great place to race. "Sun, azure waters, strong swells thanks to the trade winds, and a different landscape every time you tack," enthuses

Les Voiles has attracted no less than 65 boats this year, but does not want the event to get too much bigger due to the limited capacity of the Port of Gustavia. This year the boats are divided into six classes (see below), from veritable gems such as Dorade, a venerable yawl that won the Transatlantic in 1931, or Med Spirit, a high-tech, high-speed carbon-fiber beauty. The boats will race on 27 different courses according to category, with a starting line between Gros Ilet and the point of Colombier. The starts will be filmed via a webcam placed at Fort Oscar and transmitted online on Les Voiles de Saint-Barth website. And the public is invited to watch the race from an

## Les Voiles de Saint-Barth hopes to relive the success of their first two editions, with a blend of high-level racing and conviviality

The harbor in Saint Barthélemy is still full! After the yachts of the Bucket set sail for other shores, the sailboats for Les Voiles de Saint Barth started arriving as of last week. With its third edition now through April 7, Les Voiles is a different kind of event than the Bucket with its magnificent fleet of boats over 100'. Les Voiles is more

of a real nautical competition for boats of all sizes, while at the same time trying to maintain the conviviality of the event. Serious racing on the water and festivities for everyone on the dock: that could be the formula prescribed by François Tolède, who co-organizes the event with Luc Poupon, now under the banner of TP Sail Events.



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outlook above Fort Oscar. Each of the boats is equipped with a tracking device to transmit their movements via the Internet, or on a giant screen in the race village on the dock. This village is open

to the public throughout the weekend, and everyone is invited to the closing night party on Saturday, April 7, which includes a fireworks display.

### EXCEPTIONAL BOATS DIVIDED INTO SIX CLASSES

The 65 boats in the third edition of Les Voiles de Saint-Barth are divided into six classes: Maxi, 11 boats that are prototypes or limited series over 21 meters in length; Classics, five period or traditional yachts over 35 years of age; Spinnaker 1 & 2, 37 single-hull specialized racing boats; Non Spinnaker, nine boats racing with a rating without spinnaker; Multi-hulls, racing catamarans and trimarans from 30 to 60 feet in length. In addition to these five classes, the new class this year is the IRC 52, with four boats in this category this year.

Among the classic yachts is Cruinneag III, a handsome McPherson-Campbell ketch launched in 1936, which will race against the yawl, Dorade, which has championship American sailor Jamie Hilton at the helm. Dorade was a revolutionary yacht in its day, designed by American architect Olin Ste-

phens and built at the Sparkman and Stephens shipyard at City Island, New York, home to some of the most beautiful yachts of the 20th century.

Also on tap is the anticipated confrontation of the maxi yachts, including Sojana, Highland Breeze, and Nilaya, as well as Firefly, a Hoek 115 yacht and the first F-class racing yacht to be built in the spirit of traditional sailboats, and of course Rambler, which won the past two years.

The other classes (spinnaker, non-spinnaker, multi-hulls), feature celebrated entries such as: the Tripp 75, Blackbird, the Carkeek 40, Decision; the X65 Karuba 5; and the 63-ft trimaran Paradox designed by architect Nigel Irens. Not to be overlooked is Phaedo, the lightest and newest Gunboat by Peter Johnstone. Phaedo is anchored in Saint Barth in the winter and was the winner of the 2011 New Year's Eve Regatta.

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## Rescue At Sea Volunteers

On the Saturday of the St Barth Bucket, Ingénu Magras was at the helm

of a boat. But not one of the racing yachts: Magras is president of the local branch of the SNSM, the French National Rescue At Sea Society, and was at the helm of the Capitaine Danet, a bright orange rescue boat. During rescue missions, Max Peter or Daniel Magras is usually in charge, but on this sunny Saturday, the SNSM was charged with security for the Bucket

Magras has been president of the SNSM in Saint Barthélemy since 1986. When the rescue station was created on the island, his name immediately came to mind, as he had 30 years experience as an instructor at the municipal sailing school. It goes without saying that Ingénu Magras loves the sea. He is a born sailor, which is one of the things shared by all 17

volunteers for the Saint Barth rescue station. Many people do not realize that the SNSM is a non-profit organization, made up of un-paid volunteers. They all have rescue training and most also have a boating license, at least for a small sailboat. That is true for Patrick Garret, who along with Colbert Brin, are new members of the team. Born on the Côte d'Azur, Garret came to Saint Barth after living in Brittany, close to the sea, and he is a businessman when not out on the water. But he is available 24/7. If the CROSS Antilles Guiana, the SNSM has intervened

their kids... But we always manage to get a crew. That is why we are there, as volunteers," he adds. Then the crew meets at the boat. "Generally the captain is there first." Once the Bucket race was over, the VHF crackled with an SOS on channel 16 from a boat stuck on the coral reef in Saint Jean, in the vicinity of the Eden Rock. The SNSM rescue boat was sent there by the CROSS. In spite of taking on water, the boat in trouble is freed from the reef and accompanied to the dock in Public. Since the beginning of the year, the SNSM has intervened

which coordinates rescue missions from Martinique, needs help, the "captains" of the SNSM in Saint Barth get a phone call. They then need to quickly assemble a crew, be it night or day. "I answer just about every time, that is why I am frequently called," notes Garret. "The crew is called according to their schedule, their job,

seven times, with a total of 17 calls last year, for missions within the zone of 20 miles around the island for which it is responsible. "Sometimes even farther," indicates Magras. Some of the instances are much more serious than others. But from experience, Garret observes: "Generally speaking, people are very happy when we arrive."

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# Birds of Saint-Barthélemy

As many of you are already aware, I am distressed about the alarming decline in the bird population on this island. Ben and I have been coming here to our favorite winter getaway in February/March for the past 22 years. Since Ben retired in 2004, we have been very fortunate to spend a month each year in a St. Barthelemy villa that overlooks St. Jean Beach and the St. Jean pond. I have spent hundreds of hours observing and photographing birds on this island.

There are many ways to approach the assessment of our environment - through water quality, air quality, plant life, birds, etc. While I am a nature-lover in general, I have spent a good part of my life as a bird-watcher and bird conservationist. We all know that the elements of our environment are connected, each one a part of the big picture. If we ignore the distress signals, some of which are irreversible, we humans will be very negatively impacted.

I am attaching a document that illustrates my observations of the decline in birdlife on St. Barths. I know it is hardly a scientific document, but I hope it makes an impact nonetheless. My friends Karl Questel, a ranger with Reserve Naturel,



and Gilles Leblond, ornithologist from Guadeloupe, would be better qualified to speak to the scientific evidence of the decline in birdlife. And Deborah Brosnan, a highly-regarded marine biologist who lives here part of the year, is aware of the scientific evidence of the decline in seabirds. I do know that three species found on or near St. Barthelemy are of particular conservation concern internationally. Those are the Brown Booby, the Brown Noddy, and the Least Tern. I have been unable to observe the Least Tern population because they are here during a time of the year that we are not. We are happy to see the signs placed at the Saline salt ponds to protect the nesting

terns April - September.

It should be of great concern that while the development continues (roads, villas, businesses, etc.) and more tourists are drawn to St. Barths, the water quality of the ponds cannot support life. At least until very recently, a large hotel on St. Jean Beach was piping solid human waste into l'Etang de St.-Jean. Other businesses around the pond have contributed to its pollution.

It has been the talk of many visitors to this island that its president seems to have little regard for serious environmental issues. Vanity Fair quoted him as having said those who like the little birds and flowers should move to the Amazon. . . Obviously, President Magras has been doing many things right over the last 30 (or so) years. Why else would we all find it to be such a fantastic place to live or visit . . . "l'Isle Par Excellence." But if the Collectivite doesn't act more decisively on the environmental issues, I fear the balance is about to be tipped. That would be very sad for us all and for future generations.

Let's all do whatever we can to communicate these concerns to the people who can make a positive difference!

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
