For many people, coral is a pretty red stone used for jewelry—often for necklaces, bracelets, and earrings—popular around the world, and found extensively in Navajo designs. So coral comes from the sea, but after that?

In reality, coral is an essential element for the health of the world's biodiversity. In St Barth, our coral has a protector by the name of Didier Laplace who has launched the non-profit Coral Restoration Project (www.coral-restoration-stbarth.com). Check out our article about his recent

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

Improving The Underwater World



Didier Laplace, head of the non-profit Coral Restoration Project, visited the Mote Tropical Research Laboratory in Florida

The world’s oceans contribute to the purification of our air, by absorbing one quarter of the earth’s CO2 (carbon dioxide) emissions, at the rare of 24 million tons per day! By consequence the oceans are becoming more acidic, and at an accelerated rate. According to predictions, there will be a 170% increase in the acidity of the oceans by the end of the century if the CO2 emissions continue at the same level. Under the water, this has been somewhat of a massacre. Combined with the rise in water temperatures, the increase in acidity has had devastating effect, espe-

cially on the coral around our island, as elsewhere, such as Florida, for example. Its large reef, off the coast of The Keys, is the third largest coral reef in the world, yet is seriously threatened. To avoid the disappearance of this reef disappear, scientists and volunteers have been increasing their efforts to find solutions.

This is the case for David Vaughan, PhD in marine biology and director of the Mote Tropical Research Laboratory, in Summerland Key. Vaughan has made an incredible discovery.

After accidentally breaking off a

piece of coral when working with it, he discovered that by cutting the coral into small pieces, their growth was stimulated. “If you cut yourself, your skin heals very quickly. It’s the same thing for coral. You can grow coral the size of a plate in one to two years. In a natural milieu, that could take de 25 to 50 years,” explains the biologist in an interview for Radio Canada. “Coral represents less than one percent of the overall seabed, but we owe them 25% to 40% of the world’s fisheries. Do you like seafood? Do you want the ocean to feed us? Then we must preserve the coral reefs at all

costs,” adds Vaughan.

That was enough to pique the curiosity of Didier Laplace. In St Barth, Laplace is devoted to his mission of reviving the underwater biodiversity, and starting with restoring the coral by way of the non-profit association he founded, The Coral Restoration Project. In early February, he went to The Florida Keys to meet with Vaughan and his team, to see for himself the fabulous coral nursery developed by the Mote Tropical Research Laboratory. Thousands of coral fragments are housed in large basins, where they start to grow. Little by little they fuse to form larger coral colonies. “After they lay their eggs (yes coral can lay eggs!), they gather the young shoots and fragment them, as they grow much faster after fragmentation,” observed Laplace. And also, “they reproduce much faster. After just two years, rather than having to wait 5, 10, or 15 years sometimes,” he adds. “In fact, the scientists have realized that the coral does not reproduce in function of its age, but its size.”

Another fruitful experience at the Florida lab is placing the coral in warmer water that is also more acidic. “This provides a preview their reaction to the evolution of the oceans over the coming years,” explains Laplace. Certain specimens are proving to be more resistant than others. “The most resistant specimens are the one we should gather and

have reproduce,” he adds. In Saint Barth, Laplace would like to move to the next level, to develop not only elkhorn coral and staghorn coral, which are the most threatened, but all of the coral—stony coral, sea stars, etc— as per the lessons he learned from Vaughan. “Now when I dive, I take a cutting, and instead of simply replanting it, I cut it into pieces and replant the fragments. This will allow us, hopefully, in just five years to have restored the reef,” he hopes.

Laplace examines the coral and cuts samples of the most resistant. And only those coral that have not started branching out, and where the neighboring coral already shows signs of damage. To accelerate this task on a large scale around the island, Laplace hopes to train some volunteers to help work with the coral. “We need support,” notes the director of The Coral Restoration Project, who also has to do fund-raising. “It’s hard enough to save one species. Thanks to what we learned from these professionals that we had the chance to meet, we can do more to restore the coral, and faster. It would be a shame to remain idle,” he insists.

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WHAT IS THIS BEAR DOING IN GUSTAVIA?



What is this large bear doing standing at the end of harbor in Gustavia? Normally a denizen of the Yukon Territory in Northwest Canada, he stands with a camera around his neck like a tourist. And his left hand holds something a bit odd, some kind of agglomeration of plastic and lava, which might be found in Hawaii, rather than the cold north. Yet it's meant to represent the plastic debris that pollutes all the oceans on the planet. In fact, plastic forms a mass with natural sediments, and finishes by creating a hybrid substance, which scientists have baptized a "plas-

tiglomerate." Maybe this bear has come to question us about the future, starting with climate change and global warming, which means this bear's native habitat could become just as hot as the West Indies. With his camera, he looks at us, just as we look at him. And we find each other just as odd looking. Called "Chronicle of the Latter World," this sculpture is the work of Brooklyn-based Polish artist Joanna Malinowska, and is on temporary loan from collector Alberto De La Cruz, who is familiar with the island of Saint Barth and has sent his bear as an ambassador of environmental awareness.

How Goes The Environment In Saint Barth?

ANSWERS ON MARCH 3 & 4

The Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS), an American NGO, commissioned a report on the environment in Saint Barth, and has completed its diagnostics. Catherine Jadot, PhD in marine biology, will present the results of her report to the population of the island in two lectures this weekend, held at the Capitanerie in Gustavia (upstairs at the port offices). On Friday, March 3, at 6:30pm, her presentation will be in

French, and on Saturday, March 4, also at 6:30pm, she will speak in English. An American donor, who comes frequently to the island, funded the WCS to carry out this study, which was done in cooperation with local figures on the environmental scene. The goal is to identify the principal threats to the island's biodiversity and environmental stability, and to provide an ecological blueprint that can be followed over the next few years.


