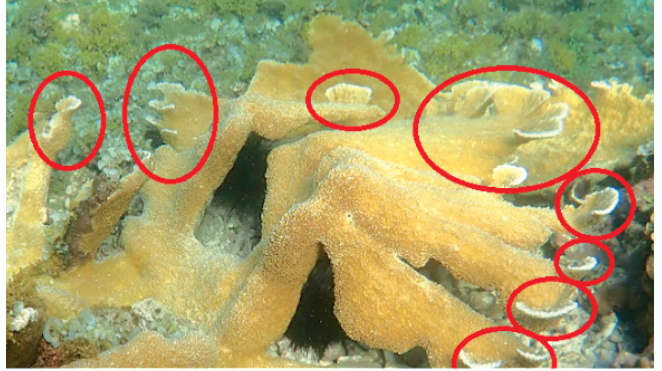

Resilience Of Vegetation and Reefs

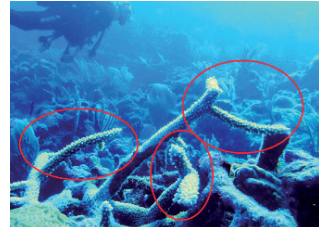


Regrowth of Acropora palmata in Grand-Cul-de-Sac in August 2018. ©ATE

The February newsletter of the Territorial Environmental Agency (ATE) includes a reassuring report that 18 months after hurricane Irma hit the island, vegetation on the beaches is coming back and coral reefs are improving. Encouraging news about the resilience of nature!

In terms of vegetation, the report notes that several species that had disappeared, torn up by Irma, had come back 13 months later on the beach in Grand Fond. "Certain plants have even taken advantage of the new configuration of the beach to spread out more, such as the beach moonflower (*Ipomoea violacea*) and beach morning glory (*Ipomoea pes-caprae*)," indicates the ATE, which also points out that the return of beach rosemary has been more timid.

If the beaches are improving, so are the coral reefs. It might take years, if not decades, until the underwater damage caused by Irma can no longer be seen. However, on dives done during

2018, ATE specialists could see that the coral has started to grow again, especially the elkhorn. The staghorn coral, which was thought to have disappeared, is coming back little by little where it was before, at Pain de Sucre, as well as new sites where some fragments survived (Baleine de Pain de Sucre for example). "This is what they call reproduction by fragmentation," explains the ATE. "In spite of the strength of hurricane Irma, these two species that grow quickly have shown us how they adapt and are resilient to this sort of phenomena. On the other hand, things that they are exposed to every day (anchoring, pollution, modification of the milieu's (temperature, turbidity...) have a more destructive impact in the long term."

Two Saint Barth Hotels Nominated For Hotel & Lodge Awards

Two luxury properties in Saint Barthélemy could be winners at 2019 Hotel & Lodge Awards, presented by the magazine of the same name. Villa Marie in Colombier (photo) was nominated in “boutique hotel” category along with eight other hotels, while Manapany in Anse des Cayes is in the running in the “eco-responsible hotel” category, also with eight competitors. The awards ceremony will take place on March 21 at the prestigious Pavillon Vendôme in Paris.



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Protection For Us, But Bad For Coral: Choose Your Sun Screen Carefully

Even if individual action against the acidification of the oceans and the rise in water temperatures is difficult, everyone can limit damage to coral reefs by buying the right kind of suntan lotion.

This is a new battleground for the Territorial Environmental Agency (ATE), led by their two new recruits, Heike and Flora. “Sun screens protect us but their ingredients are harmful to coral reefs. Three ingredients in particular: paraben, oxybenzone, and octinoxate. “These are chemical products that are also bad for the skin,” says the ATE. These substances cause deformation and discoloration of the coral, and kill it little by little by modifying its DNA.



who sell suntan lotion on the island, especially super markets and hotel boutiques. As for monoi, or other oils said to be good for tanning, they are no better for the environment. “It’s a little like putting petroleum in the water. It leaves a film that prevents fish and coral from breathing.”

New Regulations?

In 2021, the state of Hawaii will completely ban the sale of suntan lotions containing oxybenzone and octinoxate. “When they announced that, the entire world was talking about it. To make it a law, is a way to communicate positively about the images of the islands. People said, look they are taking care of their environment,” says Flora. Adding it to the regulations for the future environmental code in Saint Barth is not yet a reality. “But that could be a great thing for the island.” In addition to helping the reefs that surround Saint Barth. Legislation or not: a joint effort by those who sell and those who use these products can make a little difference.

A Little Like Oil

“We are just starting to understand the impact of suntan lotions on the natural milieu,” admits Flora. “It is difficult to quantify, and it must be noted that the biggest cause of damage to coral is modification of the ocean temperature.” Heike adds: “But what is interesting with sun screen, is that everyone can easily change their habits. The ideal solution, of course, is to protect yourself with hats, clothing, parasols..”

Most of the pharmacies on the

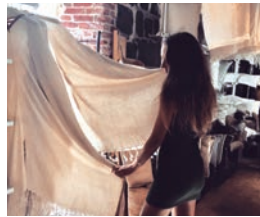
island sell creams that are good protection against UV, but do not attack the coral. It is not always easy to find these products. “There is a range of creams that are not any more expensive than the others, and protect just as well. They carry a certain logo. Otherwise, simply read the list of ingredients. In general, organic products do not use chemicals,” indicates Flora. “In Saba, that is all they sell,” notes Heike.

The two ATE agents hope to get their message across to those

Street Art Coming To Territorial Museum

Kongo, starting March 30. Born in Toulouse, France, this artist has a decidedly urban style: he is a champion of street art, specifically graffiti, which he does on walls, canvas, glass, or furniture. In 1991, he catapulted into the spotlight when his work was shown on the esplanade of the Pompidou Center in Paris. This launched an international career, which now encompasses fashion as he works in collaboration with Paco Rabanne and has created a design for the famous Hermès silk scarves. His exhibition has not yet been officially announced, but the executive council of Saint-Barthélemy recently approved its funding.

A Millionaire Creates A Yacht To Collect Trash



Who said that preservation of the planet wasn't high on the list of concerns for millionaires? Kiel Inge Røkke, one of the richest men in Norway, is proving otherwise with an unusual project. He decided to build a yacht called REV Ocean. But this boat is not like other yachts: it will set sail with research teams and be capable of collecting five tons of plastic trash from the ocean every day. This will be the largest scientific expedition boat in the world, at 182-meters-long, it can carry up to 82 people. Røkke's second goal is to create a worldwide database to include all research done about the oceans on a global basis. Finally, his dream is that the company, REV Ocean, can create a world headquarters to assemble all of the knowledge and experiences from every country. The company promises that the yacht will be built and operated with a “green philosophy,” as much as possible in light of its size and ambitions. The first expedition for the yacht is planned for 2021.

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St Barth Bucket Sets Sail

Get out your binoculars: you don't want to miss the show when the 25th edition of The St Barth Bucket Regatta sets sail on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, March 22, 23, and 24 with impressive entries and competitive racing for some really big boats.

The Bucket is an unusual regatta. All of the boats are over 100' in length, which makes for a very impressive sight, from the moment they line up on the starting line to the end of the race, as they sail around the island on Friday and Sunday, or wind their way around the wiggly course on Saturday. Catch them with their spinnakers unfurled into the wind and it's simply incredible to watch the power and prowess of these mighty sailboats. The organization of such an event is major in and of itself.

"As Event Manager, my biggest challenge is the six months of planning and preparing for the Bucket," says Jeanne Kleene, who comes to the island every year for race week. "Many details need to be as perfect as possible but no two years are ever the same. Seeing it all come together in beautiful St Barth is my biggest joy."

Over the past 25 years the Bucket has grown into a major international event, and now has four Stewards: major yacht builders Royal Huisman, Perini Navi, Rybovich, and Vitters Shipyards. "The Stewards play a major role supporting the Bucket through their commitment to bringing a world class superyacht event to

St Barth every year," explains Kleene. "They believe in and exemplify the true Spirit of the Bucket"

So what attracts the owners of these prestigious boats to the Bucket? "Camaraderie, fair and safe racing, festive social activities in a non-commercial setting in one of the most beautiful places in the world," Kleene points out.

When the 2019 St Barth Bucket sets sail there will be 34 yachts on the starting line. The smallest at 30 meters is Varsovie; the largest at 60 meters is Hetairos. There are six classes, with 31 of the yachts racing under the ORCsy rating rule in these classes: Les Gazelles des Mers (performance oriented), Les Elegantes des Mers ("modern classic"), Les Mademoiselles des Mers, Les Femmes des Mers, and Les Grandes Dames des Mer (Largest, heaviest yachts).

The remaining three yachts will

race in the Corinthian Spirit class under the ORCs rating rule in Les Voiles Blanche class. These are Child of Lir, Ohana, and Q.

One new yacht to keep an eye on: Pink Gin VI, a 54m sloop, built by Baltic Yachts, and designed by Judel Vrolijk. This Baltic 175 is the largest carbon fiber sloop in the world. Another new entry is Aquarius, a 56m ketch built by Royal Huisman and designed by Dykstra NA, featuring a classically elegant appearance. Also new to the Bucket: Aurelius, a 34m sloop built by J.O.M, designer Dykstra NA; Columbia, a 34m schooner built by Eastern Shipbuilding, designer Starling Burgess; My Song, a 40m sloop built by Baltic Yachts, designer Reichel-Pugh; and Nakupenda, a 33m sloop built by Danish Yachts, designer Fontaine.

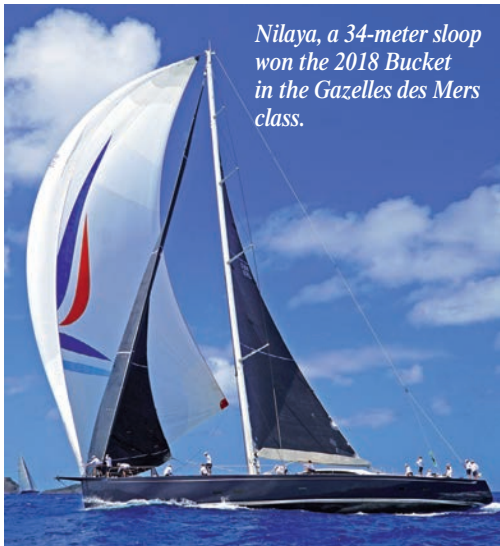
Kaori, a 38m schooner, built by Palmer Johnson, and designed by Brierly/Paine, makes a historic return to the regatta. Formerly



known as Mandalay, the yacht raced in the very first St Barth Bucket 25 years ago, and as Kaori took overall honors in 2007.

Other overall winners racing in the 2019 Bucket: 2018—Nilaya, 34m Baltic Yachts/Reichel-Pugh; 2017—SPIIP, 34m Royal Huisman/Frers; 2015—Visione, 45m Baltic Yachts/Reichel-Pugh; 2013—Adela, 55m Pendennis/Dykstra NA, all adding to an impressive list of entries for this year’s Bucket, one of the highlights of the nautical calendar in Saint Barth!

The Bucket Regatta will make its annual donation of monies from entry fees to a meaningful non-profit

activity in St Barth. This year the donation goes to two such organizations: Help St Barth and Coral Restoration St Barth. Help Saint Barth offers assistance to victims of hurricane Irma, including reconstruction and helping nature take its course though the

ongoing restoration of the island’s beautiful resources. The Coral Restoration program is engaged in the restoration and repopulation of the damaged marine reefs and beach vegetation.

BUCKET PRIZES

In addition to the trophy for the overall 2019 Bucket winner, there are lovely prizes for class winners and special awards presented by Royal Huisman and Perini Navi.

The Bucket Trophy will be presented to the overall winner of the 2019 St Barth Bucket. Yachts eligible for the prestigious award will be the ORCsy class winners with five or more yachts in class. The class winner who prevails in the 'most competitive, closely contested class' will be the overall winner.

The class with smallest series point differential between first and fourth place finishers will receive 1 point with each class in succession receiving 2, 3, 4 or 5 points. Additionally, the class with the least overall time differential (total time/total distance for all races) between the first and fourth place finishers will receive one point, with each class in succession receiving one additional point as above.

The above-mentioned points will be added together for the overall competitive class score. The class with the lowest number of points will be considered the 'most competitive, closely contested class'. The winner of this class will be the overall winner of the 2019 edition of the St Barth Bucket.

Should there be a tie, the class winner with the most yachts in class wins. In the event the tie remains unbroken, starting prowess will determine the overall winner (total time for all starts, from scheduled start to crossing the line— with the smallest total time prevailing).

The Class Winners of the 2019 St Barth Bucket Regatta will be

awarded beautiful ship's bell clocks from Chelsea Clock. 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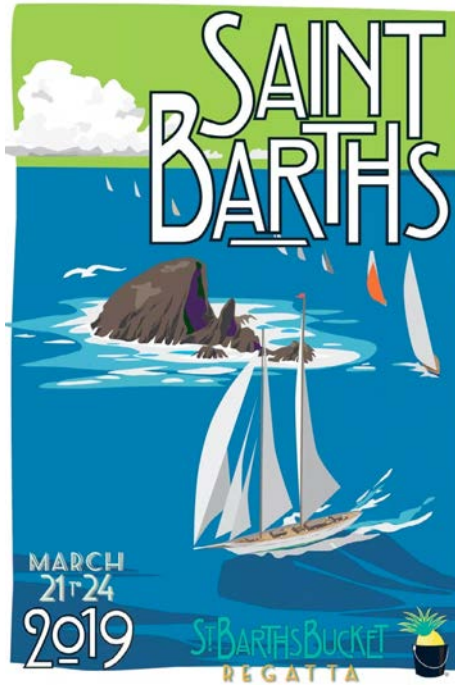

Security For Bucket Spectators On Boats

It is a wonderful opportunity to be able to follow the St Barth Bucket fleet in your own boat. However, please be aware that these giant sailboats move at great speeds and their capacity to maneuver quickly in case of emergency during the regatta is extremely limited—that is to say, virtually impossible!

Security Notice

The Port of Gustavia would like to remind its clients that during the St Barth Bucket on March 21-24, a fleet of 34 sailboats between 30 meters and 60 meters creates an impressive sight for three days of racing, Friday through Sunday, with the races starting at 11:30am. Please remember to

remain extremely prudent and stay clear of these boats as they make their maneuvers, especially during the races. In addition, from 9:30am to 11:30am, as these sailboats move away from the docks, they have priority over all other boats in the port, except ferries. The same is true during their return in the afternoon. All charter boats should organize their departure and return times outside of these hours. Private boats moored in the inner harbor are not authorized to maneuver during these time periods. The port staff will be very vigilant in enforcing these rules, as divers will frequently be in the water and everyone's safety is the top priority. The port staff thanks you in advance for your cooperation, and hopes that this magnificent

regatta sails smoothly under the best possible conditions for the safety and security of all involved.

The Best Spots to Watch

The best spot on the island to watch the fabulous show put on by the 2019 Bucket boats is the gendarmerie in Gustavia, which will be open on Friday and Saturday from 8am-12pm and 2pm-6pm, and on Sunday from 9am-12pm and 3pm-6pm. Other good spots: The hills of Lurin, Toiny, Pointe Milou, the top of Anse des Cayes, and the lookout point in Colombier, as well as the new park behind the hospital in Gustavia. You can also see the boats sail by from the tables of your favorite beachfront restaurant as you enjoy your lunch.

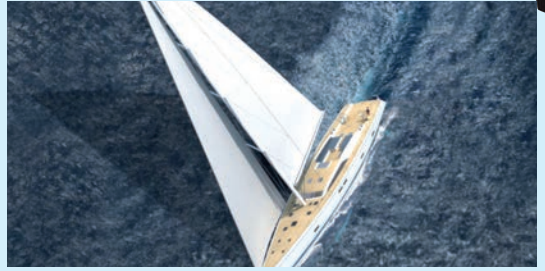

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Gery Langlais: Painting With Pastels

Gery Langlais is back in Saint Barth for the winter, his annual retreat from the cold weather in France. He crisscrosses the island on his scooter, a keen eye on the lookout for landscapes he would like to capture in his paintings. The island serves as a never-ending source of inspiration for this visual artist who paints with dry and oil pastels, a medium that allows him to capture the light and nuance of each scene, from a full moon over Pointe Milou or the wild beauty of dawn in Grand Fond to dusk on the mountains in Petit Saline or the island of Saba with a surprising sky.

His annual show at Les Artisans in Gustavia also features a painting of the Tremendous Johnson Blues Band playing at Le Select,

landscapes of beaches, and boats during The Bucket. Langlais likes to quote Baudelaire to describe his work: “The sky’s fullness, the mobile architecture of the clouds, the sea’s shimmering colorations....” His work brings these words to life.

Having studied at the Beaux Arts in Paris, and trained as an architect, Langlais was immediately captivated by the colors and landscapes of the island as soon as he discovered Saint Barth. “The nature in Saint Barth is magical, especially the vegetation with the mix of cactus of old trees—the contrast is incredible. We stayed much longer than we planned the first time,” he recalls. “And you always want to go back when there is someplace you like. I enjoy painting on site, where I get inspiration, and finishing

details back at the house.”

Langlais is still as taken by the light and scenery of the island as he was the first time he saw Saint Barth—and fell in love with its rocky coastlines, palm trees, and traditional architecture, all pictured in his work. His postcard-pretty pastels evoke the soul of the island, as seen through the eyes of someone who values its heritage and natural beauty.

Hear It From The Kids!

A Euro-Caribbean class of eighth graders in Saint Barth was asked to write about their island — in English! We think they did a great job (only a few small edits were needed...) and we are pleased to share their comments, this week about leisure activities, wildlife and restaurants. So even if you are a frequent visitor, or perhaps a resident, and know the island rather well, it's actually quite charming to see Saint Barth through the eyes of these kids who are lucky enough to live here!



Leisure activities

On our island, there are lots of sports activities, whether they are nautical or terrestrial. Nautical activities are more accessible than anywhere else thanks to our calm, warm, and turquoise water. To start, Grand-Cul-De-Sac lagoon is the most magical place to practice windsurfing and kitesurfing. From your board you can sometimes see turtles and a lot of different fish in the water. It is also possible to rent boats to explore all the small islands around St Barth: Pinel, Fourchue, Tintamarre. But our very special treasure is a natural pool in Petit-Cul-De-Sac. To find it, you need to climb a beautiful mountain. Its crystal blue water is just amazing. But never go there when there are big waves, it can be very dangerous. If you like to go for a walk, you will have a lot of fun along our incredible beaches, like in Flamands. We also have an amazing sports area in Saint Jean with a beautiful stadium. This is where you will meet our rugby club and our soccer team created by volunteers. There is also a tennis club, two steps away, where you can rent equipment and practice with professionals. If you want to try a new activity, you should go to our beach tennis club. You will have a lot of fun and new sensations. The

goal of everyone on the island is to satisfy the dreams and desires of their guests, so that each trip to St Barth is a moment of peacefulness, far from anxiety and stress.

Restaurants

In Saint Barth, there are different types of restaurants to enjoy while you are here. Typical French cuisine is often really appreciated by tourists. The majority of these restaurants are located in the capital city of Gustavia. The others are located all around the island, especially in beach hotels and in different districts like Saline, Flamands, Saint Jean, Lorient, etc... Apart from those restaurants, you can find more typical ones. Those restaurants are really appreciated by tourists too because they offer authentic Caribbean food. You should also try the first restaurant opened on the island: Le Select. It was opened in 1949! It serves cheeseburgers, fish burgers, chicken, and much more. If you feel like cooking at home, you can find certain ingredients such as lobster and excellent fish, fruits and vegetables on the island. The fishermen of Saint Barth go fishing every morning from 4am to 6am and then sell the fish to restaurants or residents.

Be careful! If you want some fish, you have to go there really early in the morning!
Bon appétit!

Wildlife

Welcome to Saint Barth! We are going to present to you the endemic species that are found in Saint Barth. First, you can easily find some medicinal plants. The leaves are used to treat burns and as a purgative, they are extremely thick and succulent. Their presence in gardens is said to keep parasites off. There are also some fruits like the malayan apple, as well as a local type of lemon and finally the physalis that we mostly use for pastry cooking and the quenette that we can savor as a syrup with rum. Furthermore, we can find the sapodilla, whose fruits and seeds are valued for their medicinal properties. You can also find the clammon-cherry, whose fruit was used as paper glue to paste stamps or seal envelopes, and the tamarind, whose fruit was used for jam, juice, or punch. There are also some protected species like the guayacan, which has a hard green wood very warm. Finally, you can find the last existing mangrove in Saint-Barts, in Grand-Cul-De-Sac, where we find four kinds of mangrove tree or a very particular crab called "the sand fiddler crab," whose one pincer is very big. Finally, you can find the red-footed tortoise and the lesser Antillean iguana as you take a walk along the road. As you can see, our island possesses a vast amount of wildlife and flora that the visitors can enjoy if they stop along the way.

Antoine Heckly

ART WITH A DASH OF FUN

Antoine Heckly, a self-taught visual artist who has lived on the island for over 25 years, does not like to be pigeonholed when it comes to style. His work ranges from island scenes to collages, frequently with a serious dash of fun, such as Cuban cigar bands or flying fish. Hyperrealism, Dadaism, and surrealism can all be found in his work. Now with a gallery in Gustavia (Passage de la Crémaillère), visitors can discover his latest work, which comprises surrealist superimpositions, collages, landscape drawings, and watercolors that are preparatory for his large oil paintings. He also has a sharp eye for photography.

Heckly's father was an architect, his mother a painter, so it stands to reason he might follow in their artistic footsteps. Once he moved to Saint Barth, he was charmed by the rugged landscapes of the island and its traditional architecture. But when he painted the small cottages, it was in his tongue-in-cheek way, such as windows looking into a house filled with the sea, and waves in the living room.

Heckly's work was part of an exhibit, "La nouvelle figuration Antillo-Guyanaise autour de Georges Rohner," which traveled throughout the Caribbean and Paris as part of the "2011 Year Of Overseas France" celebration. In 2012, the Les Voiles de St-Barth selected one of his paintings for the official poster of the regatta, and several years earlier in 2007, another of his works won a competition run by the association St-



B'Art for a pre-stamped envelope that was sold at the island's post offices. He also enjoyed a special commission from the Collectivity to create a painting for French president François Hollande when he visited the island in 2015. Heckly stepped back in time to paint a St Barth woman wearing a long dress and white pleated bonnet, the traditional mode of dress that has now vanished.

From classic to eclectic, the work of Antoine Heckly always catches

the eye. From a hyperrealist scene in bright oils to something more exotic, such as the effects of water and bubbles superimposed on languorous bodies of nude women lying on the sand, the artist never ceases to surprise.

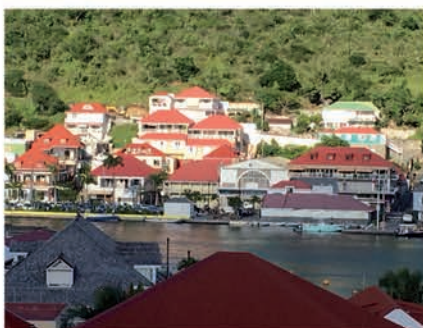
