Imperative Reason Needed To Come To Saint Barthélemy

s of now, all travelers coming to St Barthélemy must present an imperative reason to enter the island. The president of the Collectivity has written to the French Overseas Minister, hoping to improve the situation.

"Incomprehensible," as far as the president of the Collectivity is concerned. As soon as the decree was issued that imposed new rules for travelers coming to the island, Bruno Magras decided to write to French Overseas Minister, Sébastien Lecornu. Since midnight on February 2, all means of transportation to and from the island are subject to an imperative reason to travel. As of press time for The Weekly, there has not yet been a reply from the minister.

This is another blow for the island's tourism industry: all tourists, from France, the United States, and elsewhere are impacted.

"This measure, which effectively isolates our island completely, seems motivated by the goal to prevent the new variants of the virus to enter our territories," wrote the president in his letter. "This analysis drives me to question you about the reasons and the duration of this isolation of Saint Barthélemy. In fact, the variants are not going to disappear—they are even going to spread and they will certainly arrive on our


islands. The issue of these variants will be the same in two weeks, a month, two months, or six months."

Is there enough time to vaccinate everyone before the arrival of the new variants? Bruno Magras doesn't think so: "the level of vaccination in our islands is rather low for the moment. Vaccinating the entire population will take several months, like in France."

For the president of the Collectivity, the measures put into place locally to control the spread of the epidemic in St Barth only make sense if the island is open to tourists, with a potential spike in the circulation of the virus.

Number of Cases Decreases

Thirty-seven new cases of Covid-19 were recorded during the week of January 25-31 in St Barthélemy, and 30 cases for the week of February 1-5. Since the beginning of the epidemic, a total of 425 cases of Covid-19 have been counted. "In spite of a decrease in cases, the epidemiologic surveillance indicators remain high," notes the Regional Health Agency (ARS). "The virus is still actively circulating, and the situation should be watched attentively, taking into account the risk of new variants arriving on the island."

Les Voiles de St Barth Also Cancelled



dded to the Gourmet Festival, Carnival, The Bucket Regatta, and the West Indies Regatta, Les Voiles de St Barth has now cancelled due to the pandemic.

On Tuesday, February 2, Les Voiles de St Barth Richard Mille was the next to withdraw from the list of 2021 events. In a press release, the organizers explained that the new conditions to enter and leave the island, respecting a seven-day quarantine, providing a compelling reason to visit, and getting PCR tests for all involved, made it "impossible to hold an international regatta in terms of logistics."

With their priority of protecting the health of all crews and residents of the island, "the evolution of the global pandemic, especially with the appearance of the new variants, constitutes too high a risk at this time to host sailors from around the world." The organizers would like to sincerely thank their "infallible" sponsors, who will support them in producing the 2022 regatta, on April 17-23, "in better circumstances."

Financial losses for Saint Barth

The cascade of cancellations including three major nautical events on the island (The Bucket, West Indies Regatta, and Les Voiles de St Barth) for two years in a row will certainly be reflected as an important loss for the island. In 2019, the organizers of Les Voiles de St. Barth Richard Mille estimated that the regatta and related events brought in close to 4.5 million euros, a boon for the island's economy. Not to mention The Bucket Regatta, whose fleet in 2019 comprised 34 sailboats over 100' in length. This regatta of international stature has major yacht industry partners including Royal Huisman, Perini Navi, Rybovich, and Vitters. Camaraderie, good racing, and social events attract the owners of these prestigious boats to Saint Barth.

At the moment, only the 15th edition of the Transat Concarneau-Saint Barth, for duos in identical sailboats, is still on the calendar. Local sailor Miguel Danet and Frenchman Eric Peron are one of the duos scheduled to be on the starting line in Sunday, May 9 in Concarneau

Registration Open For A Half Marathon

Runners, get ready for the third edition of the Saint Barthélemy Half Marathon organized by the Saint Barth Triathlon association on Sunday, February 21. In 2020, this 21.1 km race, approved by the French Athletic Federation, attracted 198 participants, either individual runners or relay teams of three. The times to beat are those set last year by Fabien Husson and Aude Vermillard. 1h19'10" and 1h41'53" respectively.

The itinerary is essentially the same as last year, with a start at 5:45am from the stadium in St Jean, with a 2-km tour of St Jean then off to Lorient, the parking lot in Saline, back to Lorient and Saint Jean, then passing La Tourmente, Public, Gustavia, the Collectivity, and leaving Gustavia by way of the Dispensary, la Tourmente, Saint Jean, Eden Rock, and finish at the stadium.

CTTSB, and at the territorial swimming pool, and should be put in the mail box at the pool before February 19 (valid license from a running club, FF Athlétisme en Compétition, and medical certificate obligatory for marathons). 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The Bold Brush of Alain Le Chatelier

he eye is immediately drawn to the paintings of Alain Le Chatelier, a French artist with a love for the tropics. He has adapted his palette from the reds, purples, and pastels that capture his home in France to include myriad shades of azure and emerald that add tints to his toolbox, and embrace the sea, sky, and verdant foliage of Guadeloupe and Saint Barth, the islands where Le Chatelier spends every winter. He has arrived for his 2021 exhibit at Les Artisans in Gustavia, where he will be in residence every afternoon through February 25, at his easel, ready to show and discuss his work, as sanitary restrictions prohibit a traditional opening night reception.

From scenes of Berulle, the small village where he lives in France. to views of the sea from his home in Guadeloupe, or images that capture the charm of Saint Barth. Le Chatelier's canvases reflect his strong sense of color, his playfulness, and dazzling technique. He invites local flora and fauna to the party, from leathery lizards to delightful dragonflies, thorny cactus to delicate hibiscus. From luscious to luxuriant, fruit to fantasy, each painting evokes Le Chatelier's unique talent for capturing what appeals to his mind's eye.

Light is another important element in the artist's repertory, as well as shadow play. Light often filters in through a window, but in the case of two new paintings for the current exhibit, Le Chatelier's source of illumination is an overhead lamp with its diffuse radiance. One of these paintings depicts a table on his terrace in Deshaies in Guadeloupe, over-



looking the ocean at sunset. From a slightly askew bird's eye view, the setting is a mix of Caribbean lobsters, hot peppers, and limes, served on green dishes typical of Provence in the South of France. The artist's signature, always integrated into the tableau, is found on the wine label. You want to sit right down and partake of the meal. "I call this a painting of confinement," says Le Chatelier, who spent a lot of extra time at home this past year due to the pandemic.

One of the smaller paintings features a typical St Barth cottage at Domaine Felicité, where the architecture and history of the island are being preserved. Le Chatelier has embellished the garden, giving the turquoise wooden house a lush garden setting, taking the viewer back in time to a simpler lifestyle on the island. Following the exhibit is like taking a voyage—from the artist's village in France with its historic cathedral, to the hillside where he paints and gardens in Guadeloupe, and on to the shores of Saint Barth, where such iconic images as a sailboat, or the small planes forever landing and taking off, add to the sense of travel and adventure.
