



## Spring Awakening

In Saint Barth, the weather gets a tiny bit warmer, but spring here more likely heralds a very busy season in terms of noteworthy events—both nautical and cultural.

This year the two types of events are interlaced as first off the starting blocks is The Bucket Regatta, with 30 fantastic sailing yachts racing around the island on March 17-19. Next comes the 6th edition of the combined Book & Jazz Festival, March 26-April 10, with concerts across the island and literary encounters in the schools and for the public. The nautical scene revs up again on April 16-22, featuring sailboats of all sizes, skippered by local sailors to America's Cup champifor The West Indies Regatta, which tips its hat to the olden days when hand-built wooden sailing vessels carried goods from island to island. Recreating that era with classic and replica boats, and a market on the dock, pays tribute to the heritage of the island. Caribbean Cinema unspools May 3-6, with the St Barth Film Festival celebrating its 26th edition, with films from the Caribbean basin and beyond. Theatre, performed by locals as well as actors from France, takes center stage May 18-27, with the 21st St Barth Theatre Festival.

Stay tune as The Weekly covers these events, and the island becomes as busy as a beehive for a lot of very social butterflies!

## THE ST BARTH BUCKET SETS SAIL MARCH 17-19, 2023

ounded in Nantucket, Massachusetts August 1986, when Nelson Doubleday invited a few yachting buddies, with seven sailboats in the fleet, the "Bucket" Regatta was born. The winter version in St Barth started in 1995 with four fabulous vachts: Sarivah, Gleam, Mandalay, and Parlay. An invitational, highly prestigious regatta for these 100' and larger vachts, The Bucket features 30 entries this year, with the largest being Melek, a 56meter (184') from Perini Navi. Races this year are on Friday-Sunday, March 17-19.

"While the J Class will not be in play this year, they expect at least six J's at the 2024 Bucket as they prepare for their signature event at the America's Cup in Barcelona later that year," says Peter Craig, event director and race chairman, who points out that the class breaks are posted on the regatta's website: https://bucketregatta.com/

The Bucket also annually donates a portion of its entry fees and proceeds from the sale of Bucket posters to a local non-profit.

The 2023 donation will be made to The Youth Sailing Program at the St Barths Yacht Club (SBYC), an active sailing school with the youth of St Barth a major focus. Every year, hundreds of children learn to respect each other and their environment. They also learn responsibility and cooperation in the pursuit of these goals. In addition to the monetary donation to support their operations, 2023 will include a progressive



commitment to the environment. The Bucket will purchase and donate a robotic mark, which will be used by the club and hopefully at all regattas.

This year's attractive Bucket poster is on sale at Space Gallery in Gustavia, with 50 posters available on a first-come first-serve basis. To preorder, email: info@spacest-barth.com, and request an order form for my 2023 St Barth Bucket Regatta poster.

During The Bucket, the public has the unusual opportunity of walking right up to the yachts that are anchored at the dock, and admiring their well-polished teak decks, towering masts, and outstanding design by top naval architects. While some of the shoreside activities are private (an owners' party and yacht visitations), The Bucket Bar and all of the entertainment at the Bucket Marquee by the Capitainerie are open to the public, who enjoy the festivities in large numbers. This event is definitely a highpoint on the nautical calendar in Saint Barth!

### Douglas Foregger Purchases Wimco SBH Real Estate

imco SBH Real Estate has been purchased by Douglas Foregger, who has been involved in St Barth real estate for 30 years, working with many of the islands real estate companies. He was most recently Director of international Real Estate for WIMCO and has owned real estate companies in Aspen, Nantucket, and Stowe, Vermont. He is also a partner in St Barth unlisted property specialists, X Real Estate, and has partnerships with real estate companies in Lyford Cay, Harbour Island, Capri, Monaco, St. Tropez, Portofino, Lago Como, and Positano. Foregger, a father of three, is the co-founder of Help St Barth and St Barth Initiative, the US and French nonprofits that were heavily involved with relief for the island in the aftermath of hurricane Irma. He notes that Lionel Garaix will remain as president of Wimco SBH Real Estate.

The Weekly chats with Foregger on his new endeavor:

Weekly: You are involved with the villa sales arm of Wimco, not the villa rentals, correct? What does that mean exactly?

Doug Foregger: The rental arm of Wimco was sold to Nocturne about a year and a half ago, after they bought the St Barth properties rental business. At that time Tim and the Warburton family retained the real estate sales side of the business (Wimco SBH Real Estate). It is the real estate sales business that I acquired a few weeks ago.



Weekly: Your hopes/desires/plans for the future of Wimco?

**DF:** It is my hope and desire that my family and I will be responsible stewards of Wimco SBH Real Estate for the next 100 years. I feel that Wimco Real Estate can be an advocate for continued responsible and thoughtful growth without destroying what originally drew us all to this truly special place. Later, Tim Warburton visited me in my late 20s to see who this kid was that loved St Barth and was doing business with his sister-in-law Brook Lacour (Sibarth). I always thought of Wimco as the ultimate competitor and a giant, but never thought that I would own Wimco Real Estate. #### HOW TO LIMIT THE NUMBER OF VEHICLES ON THE ISLAND?

ast week, the Collectivité issued a statement reveal-✓ ing its intention to find a "process to control traffic by way of limiting vehicle registrations, regulating the system for imports, and finding alternative solutions." To do so, the first measures, which "should be put into action without delay," as indicated in the statement, concern examining the system for the importation and exportation of vehicles. To this end, new administrative procedures are already accessible on the Collectivité website (www.comstbarth.fr). "They specify the procedure for definitive or temporary exportation of vehicles, on one hand, and on the other, the process for individuals to import vehicles," points out the Collectivité, which adds: "A consultation with automobile professionals, rental agen-



cies, and socio-professionals in the tourism sector should be scheduled to discuss necessary traffic regulations for the island. Various planning sessions have taken place in recent years, especially for the Mobility Plan 2025 by the Economic, Social, Cultural, and Environmental Council."

The element that does not appear in the statement is a report on the number of imports and exports of vehicles, as well as the statistics related to these activities. Data that would allow a clear vision and permit a real evaluation of the situation. These numbers are included in the annual report for the commercial dock: In 2022, a total of 1,110 cars were imported onto the island, compared to 1,113 in 2021. For two-wheelers, 721 entered Saint Barth in 2022, compared to 576 in 2021. Finally, for trucks: 14 in 2022 while there were 19 in 2021.

#### WILL THE WINNERS IN ANTIGUA BE THE WINNERS IN SAINT BARTH?

**♦** he 14th edition of the RORC Caribbean 600 took place on February 17-24, 2023. The competitors raced a circuit of 670 miles, starting and finishing in Antigua. Many of the future adversaries in the 12th edition of Les Voiles de St. Barth Richard Mille performed admirably in this nautical challenge. Most notably the outstanding results clocked by the crew of the Multi70 Zoulou, skippered by Erik Maris, which won the Multihull Line Honors by just 11 seconds ahead of their closest competitor, before finishing third overall in compensated time for the Multihull category. And it's not just in the multihull class that competition will be keen when sailing around the island in April. In fact, the Vol-



vo70 Pyewacket, with American Ben Mitchell at the helm, proved merciless as the IRC Overall winner in 2023, also sailing to victory in the Super Zero. First place in the IRC Two-Handed category went to Notre Méditerranée – Ville de Nice, the JP54 sailed by Jean-Pierre Dick, recent

winner of the Route du Rhum – Destination Guadeloupe in the Rhum Mono class, who will also be a serious contender in Saint Barth. As will the crews of Pata Negra and EH01, who were among the winners in IRC 1 then in IRC2.

## A 4X4 ABANDONED AT LA TOURMENTE ROUNDABOUT



Before the first rays of the sun rose over Saint Barthélemy on Thursday, February 23, drivers were surprised to see a 4-wheel-drive vehicle parked right in the middle of the traffic circle at La Tourmente. The driver apparently drove straight when coming up the hill from Public. The explication of the "landing" of the car on the traffic circle has not been explained, at least not to the public. Luckily, this "accident" did not require emergency services when it happened, and the driver left the scene before being seen.

Perhaps it was simply an activist denouncing the lack of parking spaces on the island? Or a practical joke played by a mischievous friend of the car's owner? In any case, the 4X4 was removed from the scene in the late morning on the same day, using a crane under the supervision of the territorial police. As for sanctions, a ticket for illegal parking and a slap on the wrist are the only risks for the driver. The good news is that neither the Arawak statue nor the pelican was damaged by the car when it pulled in next to them.



SAINT BARTH AND ITS BIODIVERSITY

### The Spotted Eagle Ray, The Electric Hunter

Each week, the Journal de Saint-Barth, in partnership with the Territorial Environment Agency (ATE), presents a species (fauna or flora, terrestrial or marine) that populates the vast biodiversity of the island.

This week: The Spotted Eagle Ray (Aetobatus narinari).



#### • Where do they live?

The spotted eagle rays live in tropical and subtropical waters, in bays and lagoons often close to a coral reef, at a depth between the surface and 250 feet. They also rest on the soft, sandy ocean floor at times.

#### • What do they eat?

They eat small fish and crustaceans (crabs and shrimp) and mollusks (octopus, whelks, bivalves). Thanks to their flat head with its ultrasensitive cells, they dig in the sand and find the electric fields of their prey. Their mouths are equipped with plate-like teeth with which they crush the shells of their victims.

#### Did you know?

With their large pectoral fins, the rays give the impression of flying under the water. In spite of their apparently slowness, they also have a great capacity for acceleration, which allows them to escape such predators as the hammerhead shark. They live an average of 20 years, can measure as long as 10 feet, and weigh up to 500 pounds.

## REGULATIONS IN EFFECT IN THE RÉSERVE NATURELLE

Following two accidents that took place in the Réserve Naturelle de Saint-Barthélemy, and which required rescue operations, the Territorial Environmental Agency points out that there are safety regulations in effect. First, the speed limit is 5 knots in all waters of the Réserve Naturelle, including the bays and a distance of 300 meters from the coast, as well as less than 100 meters from the islets around Saint Barth. This speed limit guarantees the safety of all (swimmers, sea turtles....) as well as overall tranquility of the sites. In addition, a signalization buoy is obligatory for all persons practicing scuba diving or underwater aqua trekking. No boats can go within 100 meters of that buoy. Finally, in the lagoon at Grand Cul-de-Sac, kitesurfing is only authorized more than 50 meters from the shore (other than getting the kite into the water) and is officially prohibited on the coral reef.

## New Traffic Patterns; New Traffic Circle On The Drawing Board



For the moment, there are only a few modifications to the traffic patterns in St Barth. Yet these are a harbinger of things to come, as the new territorial council continues to improve the flow of traffic on the island's roads.

The first change was new signage that informs all drivers of their speed as they descend the hill from Coupe Gorge toward the small traffic circle near Villa Créole in Saint Jean. There is also a new, solid white line that indicates a no-passing zone along the entire length of the curve where a 25-year-old on a quad was killed a few months ago.

For less dramatic reasons, two additional traffic modifications have been implemented: one at Super U; the second leaving the parking lot at the airport. These changes means that drivers coming from Saint Jean cannot turn left to go to Super U; and those leaving the parking lot at the airport are also no longer able to turn left. They must all continue as far as the traffic circle at La Tourmente and come back in the direction of Saint Jean to turn right for the supermarket or continue on their way.

To leave the road that leads to Super U, after respecting the Stop sign, drivers can turn left or right onto route 209A. These new rules are but temporary, as the Collectivité plans to create a new traffic circle to replace these intersections.
