hat a week! The St Barth Bucket is in town. There are art openings from the Wall House Museum to the Hotel Christopher by way of Space Gallery. Sailors. Art collectors. There will be a lot of everything this week. Except water.

As my mother-in-law always says, "it doesn't rain during Lent," as if nature gives up something it needs until after Easter. But the lack of rain coupled with high swells that have forced the desalination plant to close a few times temporarily has created a tough situation on the island: No H2O.

It is surprising to learn that many homes and businesses do not have cisterns, when everyone here knows that a cistern is the best insurance against drought conditions, or simply finding yourself without water if the city water plant is offline. Which has been the case lately. On Sunday, the island was giving out 100 liters of water to residents, but you had to bring your own jerricans or containers (one enterprising person had them for sale online...). Villa owners are getting calls from angry renters: there isn't any water!

How long have we been saying that the infrastructure is stretched to—or beyond—capacity. This is a case in point. This is an island without a drop of fresh water: no rivers, streams, creeks, or wells with fresh water. If you drill deep enough you can find brackish water, which can be boiled for use in showers, toilets, etc. So as the world is trying to get away from single use plastic, I wonder how many plastic bottles of water will be consumed here this week.

Maybe the trend for massive swimming pools should be reserved and the really big ones should be turned into community cisterns. The island used to have those for moments like this, but it seems like the race for luxury has overtaken common sense!

The Bucket Is Back!



♦ his is the week: Bucket Week.. when the St Barth Bucket Regatta comes to town and the island of St Barth hosts some of the most prestigious sailboats to ply the seas. A few statistics: three days of racing, March 17-18-19, 2023, with 25 racing entries (six non-racing), over 1.2 kilometers of boats if all placed in a line, 200 crew, 120 industry professionals, and 1,000 racing fans. Not to mention the racing vachts divided into five classes: three 'conventional' ORCsy classes and two Corinthian Spirit (ORCcs) classes. It's a big week when the restaurants are full and the docks feature The Bucket bar and evening events with live music, open to all.

"More and more superyacht owners have come to recognize that the thrill of the regatta circuit coupled with the relaxed social ambiance they can enjoy ashore with fellow owners, guests and crew at a regatta makes the perfect complement to their ocean cruising itineraries," according to the folks at Royal Huisman super-yacht builders in Vollenhove, The Netherlands, one of the longtime stewards of The Bucket.

This year, Royal Huisman is once again represented at The Bucket, as are such builders as Perini Navi, Palmer Johnson, Palmer Johnson, Classen Jachtbouw, Brooklin, Fitzroy, Nautor Swan, Baltic Yachts, and others.

"The Bucket's longstanding success as the largest most popular superyacht regatta on the global circuit is due to a number of key elements: the unrivaled appeal and attractiveness of St Barth, the cooperation by the island's government and port authority, the Stewards' commitment to the non-commercial 'spirit of the Bucket,' fabulous the tradewind racing conditions; and the camaraderie amongst the participating yacht owners, crews and guests," comments event director & regatta chairman Peter Craig.

The diverse fleet includes sloops. ketches. schooners, with length ranging from 28-57 metres, displacement between 76-470 metric tons, and a speed differential from the fastest to slowest rated yacht in fleet of nearly five minutes per mile (moderate wind range). Let's hope the weather contributes to the success of the race, with sunny skies and fair winds-the sight of these boats with their spinnakers unfurled as they round the island is simply spectacular!


The endless landscapes that form the backdrop and inspiration of Lindbergh's photography are totally unspoiled and immediately recognizable as St Barth. Nothing superficial, only nature and human. Lindbergh likes to let the models move in their own way, connecting with the wind and being pulled from one side to the other by the long 16-meter silver sheet, which she uses to harness the power of the wind—making the invisible, visible. Nature is part of the storytelling and its unpredictability plays the co-starring role in these pieces. It is a dance between the elements and the model.

Photographer and pilot, Isabelle Lindbergh was born in Senlis near Paris, France. Granddaughter of American aviator Charles Lindbergh, (the first to cross the North Atlantic non-stop in May 1927), Lindbergh formalized her exploration of the arts by embarking on photography studies at some of the most renowned schools in France and in 2015 she obtained her Masters in photography. Since graduating 10 years ago, Lindbergh's savoir-faire has been requested in various fields, from fashion, cosmetics, and luxury to music. Her focus has now turned to fine art and having the freedom

Production Problems And Too Much Demand: Water Becomes Scarce!

For the past two weeks, production and distribution of water on the island has been subject to numerous problems, primarily caused by two successive incidents of high swells and over consumption!

7 ater, water everywhere but not a drop to drink. That is the situation facing numerous Saint Barth residents who are venting their frustration on social media, for example, or emails to the SAUR, or local water company. On an island surrounded by the sea, it is indeed frustrating to have such ongoing, abnormal water issues. Two reasons have caused this situation, according to the SAUR and the SIDEM, which runs the desalination plants in Public: two successive incidents of high sea swells and a demand for water that exceeds their capacity to produce it.

If the SAUR is continually asking the population to show their solidarity and civic responsibility by using as little water as possible, they did not respond favorable when Le Journal de Saint Barth requested more substantial, technical explanations about the problem. On the other hand, the SIDEM was more forthcoming.

Laurent Berry, director of operations for the SIDEM, insists that the difficulties encountered over the past two weeks are due to high sea swells. "The swells bring sand and algae to the intake valves," he explains. "This can cause the filters to break. In just 20 minutes last week, we filled a bucket with sand. That jams the machinery and we are obligated to stop to clean it out as to not risk damage." Actually, the desalination plant does not remain stopped for long. But when production starts up again, Berry admits that they cannot produce

enough water to meet the demand.

How To Decrease Water Usage

"For me, it's a lack of civism," says the operations director. "As soon as the water goes back on, there are abuses by people who fill their cisterns, so there is too much water being stored. We cannot even fill the reservoir in Colombier as the water is used too quickly. Unless there is less usage, we will not succeed." To illustrate his point, Berry notes that the maximum capacity of the water plant is 190 cubic meters per hour (50,000 gallons) and adds: "On Monday (March 6), water consumption was 300 cubic meters per hour (almost 80,000 gallons)." In short, this is much higher than what can be produced. Due to the large swells and the frequent stopping of the machinery, the water plant (according to a March 4 notice by the SAUR) is producing roughly 140 cubic meters per hour. "Water usage is extremely elevated and greatly superior to the level of production," added the SAUR in another announcement on March 6. "Access to city water in all neighborhoods can only be ensured if everyone is more reasonable in their consumption. Do not waste water, it is precious."

More Perturbations Expected

Social media pundits are pointing their fingers at hotels. But some of the hotels along the shore have their own desalination infrastructure. Other people claim there are leaks in the water pipes that have been repaired, but in the meantime caused temporary cuts in service. Many people who live high in the



hills have found that their water has been shut off for days, even for weeks in some cases. Such as Pointe Milou, Camaruche, and the heights of Saint Jean, for example. Which is exactly way the SAUR in their umpteenth notice, issued on March 8, advised: "Avoid stocking reserves of water so that access can be given to people who do not have cisterns or those at the end of the pipeline. Use water wisely, only for necessary domestic needs, in order for the network levels to rise and provide service to the windward side of the island."

For now, and with new swells expected, the situation does not seem to have gotten any better. In fact, the SAUR warns, "Usage is currently too high for the water levels to rise significantly. Which means the lack of water will continue on the island. And if there are more high swells, water production could once again be stopped. If that is the case, the perturbations in terms of water distribution will continue."

Stanislas Defize:

A Retrospective Of His Life And Work

March 16 through May 31, 2023, the Territorial Wall House Museum presents an exhibit on the work, and life journey, of artist and world traveler Stanislas Defize who, like so many others, fell in love with Saint Barth when he arrived for the first time in 1980.

hen he passed away in 2017, Stanislas Defize left a rich legacy of his passage on earth and at sea. Artist, world traveler, bon vivant—much of his work focuses on Saint Barthélemy, the island he fell in love with the first time he arrived by boat in 1980. From March 16 through May 31, the Territorial Wall House Museum presents a major exhibit of his work, as well as his personal history. One that is often intertwined with that of Saint Barth.

Born in 1942 in Belgium, Stanislas Defize discovered his passion for art, and luckily he also discovered he had a lot of talent. He started by taking classes in the ateliers of Hergé (the creator of Tintin), as an illustrator. The young man also liked bringing blank pages to life, literally as well as figurately, as reflected in his desire to set out to sea. He started his career of ocean crossings-to Africa, as well as across the Atlantic. During that voyage, he dropped his anchor for the first time in Saint Barthélemy. Under the spell of this charming little rock with its unspoiled landscapes and welcoming population, he decided to return every year.

An Illustrated History of Saint Barth

On every subsequent visit to St Barth, the artist stayed for several months. After a few years of discovering the island, he started writing and illustrating a book about Saint Barth. Published in 1987, it evokes a well-documented history



of the island. "He did his illustrations using watercolors," notes Charles Moreau, director of the Wall House Museum, "which signifies he had moved away from the line-drawing technique of the Belgian school." With the book in hand, Moreau comments on the excellent "sense of framing, the composition, and the picturesque," created by the artist.

At the same time, Stanislas Defize never stopped drawing the land-scapes of Saint Barth, often focusing on the island's traditional cottages. "These illustrations were printed as lithographs and sold on the island at the time," explains Moreau. As a result, they make up a large part of the exhibit. Many have been loaned by island residents who purchased a print, if it was not given to them by the artist. A call for loans went out so that the museum can best show the artist's work to those who visit the exhibit.

and learn about the deep connection that Stanislas Defize had with the island, as well as "the vision of someone who loved Saint Barth," Moreau adds.

Beacons At Sea

The exhibit also provides an opportunity to revisit an adventure that the artist shared with two friends, Marc de Rosny and Yan Van den Haute. In August 2004, the three set out on an expedition baptized "Prototype," the name of the 14meter sailboat they were taking from Saint Barth to Patagonia, the southernmost tip of South America, spending nine months at sea, covering 14.000 nautical miles. and returning in May 2005. An exceptional enough adventure, but to help finance it Defize fabricated, pair by pair, sculptures in the shape of small beacons. "The idea was that the buyer would keep the beacon made of aluminum, while the sailor tossed the other beacons, St Barth Weekly n°478

made of bright yellow fiberglass, into the sea, at a spot indicated by the buyer," explains Moreau. Each sculpture was sealed closed, containing a message with the necessary indications to find its owner. To date, only one of the sculptures tossed into the sea has been found: In 2011 by a couple walking along the coast of Brazil. They opened the beacon and made contact with the owner, a resident of Saint Barth. This expedition was significantly illustrated by Stanislas Defize and a film made about the adventure will be shown at the museum during the run of the exhibit.

In addition, the museum will show additional pieces of art that are not directly related to Saint Barth, such as illustrations that Defize made during a voyage on the Indian Ocean in 2010. Visitors will also find several issues of Le Journal de Saint-Barth, such as one from 1997, when or April Fool's Day the artist created drawings that presented a fake project for an extension of the Port of Gustavia. With his usual talent. complete with his usual dose of mischievousness.

The opening reception for the exhibit is Thursday evening, March 16 at the Wall House Museum, which is open Tuesday 2pm-7pm, as well as Wednesday-Saturday 9am-12pm & 2pm-7pm. Free entry.

SAINT BARTH AND ITS BIODIVERSITY

Caribbean Hermit Crab, The Purple Pincher

Each week, the Journal de Saint-Barth, in partnership with the Territorial Environment Agency (ATE), presents a species (fauna or flora, terrestrial or marine) that populates the vast biodiversity of the island.

This week: The Caribbean Hermit Crab (Coenabita clypeatus).



Where does it live?

The Caribbean Hermit Crab lives in the West Indies, Southern Florida, Venezuela, Bermuda, Puerto Rico, and Haiti.

What does it eat?

It is both omnivore and detritivore. In other words, it can eat organic debris, but it should nourish itself in a more balanced manner. Otherwise, its development can be impacted, or it might shed its shell during its evolution and this transformation can result in a calcium deficiency, for example.

• Did you know?

The Caribbean Hermit Crab has a lifespan of close to 30 years. In spite of its appearance, this crustacean is not actually a crab. Its soft abdomen is protected by a shell. It is also called the Purple Pincher, due to its large purple claw, while the rest of its body is reddishorange.

Kay Quattrocchi: Between Art, Poetry and Science

nternationally acclaimed mixed-media artist, painter. sculptor Kay Ouattrocchi has been based in Saint Barthélemy for the past 30 vears. She is interested in such scientific subjects astrophysics, and the link that unites Consciousness and the Universe, as well as time travel and the metaverse. She creates quantum works on, among others, the Higgs Boson, Neutrinos, Antimatter, black holes, gravitational waves, etc. and how these forces interact with us constantly. She is the creator of the "Wall of Light" installed outside the Collectivity (Town Hall) of St Barthélemy. Her latest solo show, Between Art, Poetry and Science, at The Hotel Christopher in Pointe Milou runs from March 17-April 22, 2023.

"One day, a Japanese friend who is passionate about haiku, said to me: "yes you draw very well, But!...one day you will be able to try to put only some lines, some colors, and we will feel the wind, the sea, the movement of the sails, without other details, just the presence of that, and there you will see me coming to say to you: here is that it is the true work!" He is no longer here, my very kind friend from the land of the rising sun, but I followed his advice, I hope that the drops of water from the sea and the wind will come to caress your face and make you feel the emotions of these champions who run on the water with their sublime yachts,



every year they fill our harbor and our heart, it is a feast to nature and to life," notes Quatt r o c c h i (www.kayquattrocchi.com/)

"On the same principle of "presence" in everything around and within us, after several years of research and study in astrophysics and philosophy on the great subject of the mysteries of space and our consciousness, after staging the bosons and neutrinos that I had the privilege of presenting at the Christopher Hotel in 2014, I present my latest collection on magnetic fields. I am increasingly interested in magnetics and quantum fields that could provide us with a lot of

information about our true nature," says the artist.

"The oceans, because they contain salt, conduct a little electricity. When this salt water moves in the earth's magnetic field, a small, electric current flows through it, as stipulated by Faraday's law. This "mobile" electric current (extremely weak, rest assured) will in turn generate a magnetic field." The work in Quattrocchi's Magnetic Collection evokes what the magnetic field of water might look like." Quattrocchi adds. "For me, as an artist, I like to represent these fields but more in an abstract way."


