But all joking aside, as reported in this issue of The Weekly, there is an epidemic of dengue on the island, with more than 570 cases reported since mid-September. FRENCH WEEK AT LE BARTHÉLEMY HOTEL

Through Sunday, December 17, Le Barthélemy Hotel & Spa is organizing its French Week, an event featuring starred chefs such as Jérémy Czaplicki, Paolo Boscaro... winemakers including Frédéric Lemett, Jean-Luc Vitoux..., and pioneering biodynamic oenologists from the Champagne and Burgundy regions. "This week celebrates French lifestyle, culture, and gastronomy through lunches, 4-hand dinners, beach barbecues, cocktails, and a gala evening," explain the organizers. French Week also integrates sustainable development into every aspect of the program, from "zero waste" workshops to biodynamic wine tastings and eco-responsible mixology "master classes." The idea for this event, which provides which an immersion in the quintessential French art de vivre, was born through collaboration between prestigious Champagne Hospitality houses," emphasizes Le Barthélemy. "Beyond this sensory odyssey, French Week is also an invitation to contribute to efforts to respect and protect the environment." SEVENTH ASTRONOMY EVENING



The seventh "night of the stars" takes place on Sunday, December 16 in Saint Barthélemy. The event will take place at the former weather station close to the lighthouse overlooking Gustavia. From 7pm-10pm, several telescopes will be made available for the public to observe the sky and its stars. From 7:30pm-9pm, a creative table entitled "small starry creation" will be organized, and a video projection of astrophotography will be shown.

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THE PREFECTURE ANNOUNCES INTENSIFIED CONTROLS

In a press release issued on Monday December 4, Vincent Berton, delegate Prefect for the Northern Isles, noted that consumer protection and compliance with consumer and competition law are priorities for the French government on both islands. "State agents, in particular from the Competition, Consumer Affairs, and Fraud Control Department, are fully mobilized to inform and support consumers and businesses, as well as to carry out investigations and controls," notes the prefect. In fact, he points out that these checks concern both Saint-Barthélemy and Saint Martin, and all sectors of activity: from commerce to catering, tourist services, business services, etc. "In the event of infringements, the findings made by enforcement officers may lead to administrative fines or even criminal proceedings." emphasizes the government official. Vincent Berton recalls that in Saint-Barthélemy, an inspection operation carried out last May revealed breaches "in more than twenty

establishments." Several of these are now subject to administrative fines.

In his press release, the prefect calls on all professionals to comply with all legal and regulatory texts applicable to their sector of activity. In addition to consumer protection, for which these texts were designed, the quality of the hospitality offered on our two islands is a determining factor in their attractiveness, particularly for tourists," he explains. Visitors and residents alike must have confidence in the goods and services they buy. The behavior of a few establishments that are clearly not concerned about respecting the rules must not be allowed to tarnish the work carried out on a daily basis by all law-abiding professionals." Consequently, at the debut of the new tourist high season, Vincent Berton warns that inspection operations will once again be organized "on a very regular basis" in Saint Barthélemy over the coming weeks and months.



Several operations have already been carried out on the island in recent weeks. These have involved the intervention of the customs sniffer dog, sometimes in establishments open to the public, but also through checks carried out by the gendarmerie. For example, all restaurant owners have been reminded of the ban on smoking in premises that do not have three unobstructed exterior openings. Under penalty of sanctions.

DENGUE EPIDEMIC REMAINS SEVERE

If the number of cases of dengue in Saint Barth decreased slightly by the end of last week (82 compared to 89 the week prior) the severity of the epidemic has not flagged. As a result, there were 31 people who visited the emergency room at De Bruyn Hospital last

week, compared to 25 the week before. However, the number of hospitalizations remained stable with four patients admitted compared to five the week before. "All these numbers illustrate the intensity of the epidemic," notes Vincent Berton, prefect for the

Northern Isles. Since mid-September, more than 570 clinical cases of dengue have been officially reported in Saint Barthélemy. A number that does not encompass all those who have had the virus but did not go to see a doctor.

A VISIT BY THE ROTARY GOVERNOR

With the utmost discretion, Rotary District 7020 governor David Kirkaldy paid a visit to Saint Barthélemy. Representing the majority of the islands in the Antilles Archipelago, he was welcomed by Nils Dufau, president of the Rotary Club of Saint Barth. "He came to take stock of the local, regional, and international situation, mainly in terms of health, education, and ecology, and to ensure the District's assistance in case of need," writes the Rotary on social media. "Our association also assured him of our support for the eradication of polio worldwide, a major task led by Rotary International and Rotary clubs worldwide. His visit also served to reinforce the natural ties that bind the Caribbean islands together, as well as inter-island solidarity in the wake of natural disasters: hurricanes, Covid-19, earthquakes... On these subjects, the St. Barthélemy Rotary Club has been proactive in helping

the population, here and elsewhere." During his visit and various meetings with the local Rotary branch, the third replanting of the garden along the Quai de la République was discussed. After Irma, in 2017, "this garden was entirely replanted by the Rotary Club of Saint Barthélemy, the Rotary District, a Rotary Club from the United States, and a number of local businesses who came to support the initiative. Symbolically, David Kirkaldy planted a Creole Amarre (Thrinax) in the garden, as "an emblem of authenticity and resistance," according to the Rotary, which will shortly be launching a campaign to raise awareness of the issue of discarding cigarette butts on the ground. The Club plans to give away 10,000 pocket ashtrays across the island.

A TRIBUTE TO WILLIAM DILANT, AVIATOR AND WAR VETERAN, BY BRUNO MAGRAS

William Dilant passed away at the age of 85 on Saturday, December 2, 2023. A resident of Saint Barthéle-



my for many years, his final resting places is in the family tomb at the cemetery in Saint Jean. A former professional pilot William Dilant discovered Saint Barthélemy in the 1970's. At the time, he was flying for Air Guadeloupe. It was during these years that he met a future aviator who has since come a long way, Bruno Magras. "We became friends in the 70s," recounts the former president of the Territorial Collectivity. He fell in love with Saint Barthélemy and ended up buying an apartment here. He was a war veteran and whenever he could, he took part in official events." Their mutual passion for aviation naturally brought the two men together. "When I got my twin-engine rating aboard a BN2, William was my instructor," recalls the former director of Saint-Barth Com-muter. "Back then, all the pilots knew each other. William and I were very good friends. He had obtained a plot in the Saint Jean cemetery because he wanted to be close to the airport runway. He was a very nice guy, always very sociable, never angry. And a very good pilot!"

A STRANGE OBJECT ON THE BEACH IN FLAMANDS

A long tube, a sort of canister or tank, washed up on the beach in Flamands on Sunday December 3. Could it be from SpaceX's Starship rocket, which exploded in mid-air on November 18?

On the morning of Sunday December 3, people walking on the beach in Flamands spotted a most peculiar object washed up on the sand. A long, impressive black cylinder, a sort of canister, tube, or tank. In any case, by late morning, the gendarmerie was alerted to this unusual occurrence.

After several long minutes spent making sure that the object was harmless, the gendarmes set up a security perimeter to prevent the handful of beach-goers from getting too close to satisfy their curiosity.

Since Sunday, despite the sending of photographs, the object has still not been officially identified. Neither its provenance nor its exact function has been established with any certainty. It was removed from the beach on Monday morning by the Collectivity's technical services. No information has been released on where it has been stored.

Part Of SpaceX's Starship Rocket?

After some research, it seems that this unidentified stranded object corresponds to one of the devices used on SpaceX's Starship rocket. It appears to be a COPV, or "composite overwrapped pressure vessel." These high-pressure tanks are mainly used to store fluids in a small space. As their name suggests, they are generally made of a composite material that surrounds a metal or plastic core, providing high strength yet low weight. In the context of the Starship



rocket, COPVs are essential for keeping gases under high pressure, such as helium or nitrogen, used for various functions such as maintaining pressure in the main fuel tanks or activating certain rocket systems. Their composite design offers the advantage of high strength with minimal weight, a crucial factor in space vehicle design where weight reduction is essential. COPV's are currently used to contain high-pressure fluids for propulsion, scientific experiments, and life-support applications," explains the Nasa website. These COPVs offer a significant weight advantage over all-metal containers. Having put forward a few guesses, one question remains: how did this supposed COPV come to be stranded on a beach in Saint Barthélemy?

In all likelihood, it could be part of the Starship rocket, whose two stages exploded in flight north of

Puerto Rico on November 18. The explosions were heard in Saint Barth, where many residents wondered about the origin of these successive and distinct, albeit distant, detonations. For the record, after lift-off from the Boca Chica base in Texas at 7:03 am on November 18, the rocket's propulsion stage successfully separated from the Starship, the rocket's upper stage. However, rather than landing in the Gulf of Mexico as planned, the booster exploded and fell straight back to earth. As for the Starship, which appeared to be on course to complete its mission of flying around the Earth in an easterly direction and landing in the Pacific Ocean off the coast of Hawaii, it exploded a few minutes later from a height of 145,000 meters in space. Needless to say, the rocket's debris landed and scattered over an area of dozens, if not hundreds, of kilometers.



SAINTE-BARBE, BETWEEN FESTIVITIES AND SOLEMNITY

The traditional festivities of Sainte-Barbe, the patron saint of firefighters, kept the professionals and volunteers of the local fire department busy throughout the weekend of December 2 and 3. Here's a recap of the celebrations, which also included an official ceremony on Sunday to reward firefighters for diplomas obtained or promotions in rank, and the annual Fireman's Ball.

Extracts from the speech by Xavier Lédée, president of the Territorial Collectivity

"On this island, we all appreciate the work accomplished by this service, its knowledge of the island, and its constant commitment to serving the population," said the president, who also spoke about the future fire station: "This project represents a total investment of 12 million euros, with work initially scheduled to take 18 months, and the site finally due to be handed over on May 10, 2024, after 24 months of construction. The structure will house the crisis operations center, the ORSEC headquarters, social facilities for professionals and volunteers, as well as an integrated monitoring center to optimize and modernize security on the island. But no housing. Xavier Lédée mentions the purchase of a boat at a cost of 407,212 euros, a tanker for 330,000 euros, and three other vehicles, and stresses that "the resources and investments would not be effective without the squad," but does not address the question of housing. However, he insists on the importance of training for a service that "represents a lot on the island," and assures its support.



A minute of silence was observed in tribute to the firefighters who died in the line of duty.



On Sunday, prefect Vincent Berton and the president of the Collectivity, Xavier Lédée, presented decorations and new ranks to several of the firefighters.

AN INTERNATIONAL INITIATIVE TO COMBAT SARGASSUM SEAWEEED

On December 2 in Dubai at the COP28, Philippe Vigier, delegate minister for Overseas France, launched the International Initiative to Combat Sargassum, with the support of the Dominican Republic, Costa Rica, Mexico, and the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States.

An international initiative to combat sargassum is a project launched on Saturday December 2 in Dubai, at the COP28—United Nations Climate Change Conference—Philippe Vigier, delegate minister for Overseas France. The launch of this diplomatic initiative was also supported by the Secretary of State for Development, Francophony, and Partnerships, Chrysoula Zacharopoulou, the Region of Guadeloupe (represented by vice-president Sylvie Gustave-Dit-Duflo), the European Union, Costa Rica, and the Dominican Republic, with the support of the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS). The initiative to combat sargassum is part of the measures taken by the Overseas Inter-ministerial Committee. For Philippe Vigier, this "diplomatic event should mobilize and raise the awareness of the entire international community, in particular those working for biodiversity, the fight against climate change, and the preservation of the environment and our ecosystems."

A Better Response To This Challenge

A growing concern in the overseas territories of the Caribbean and in the islands and countries of the region, sargassum is a phenomenon that is now spreading to other areas of the globe. "The abnormal proliferation of sargassum and its massive stranding on the coasts of the Caribbean and the Gulf of Mexico since 2011 represent worrying threats to coastal biodiversity, the health of populations and

economic activity," recalls Philippe Vigier, who insists on the need for increased international cooperation "to better respond to this challenge, whether in the field of research, exchange of best practices, consideration of sargassum reservoirs or treatment of stranded seaweed."

The ultimate aim of this initiative is to "launch a multilateral process" with the ambition of culminating in an international action plan at the United Nations Conference on the Oceans in Nice in June 2025. It also aims to strengthen regional cooperation, notably through the Cartagena Convention on the protection of the marine environment in the Caribbean, as well as the consequences of the European Interreg SARG'COOP project led by the Region of Guadeloupe. The initiative launched at COP28 is an unprecedented step that must be undertaken in close coordination with the new European commitments that are, as Philippe Vigier assures us, "currently being drawn up in this field." In addition, the aim is to work within the United

Nations to develop a legal definition of sargassum that will facilitate its treatment. But it will also help to find funding for research and treatment of what the Ministry describes as "pollution," by involving the private sector. "This diplomatic initiative, which fully associates the Region of Guadeloupe Region and the minister delegate, is a good example of international cooperation between the French Government and our overseas territories to defend their concerns and promote their expertise," writes the office of the minister delegate for Overseas France.

28TH COP

The first COP—United Nations Climate Change Conference—took place in 1995 in Berlin, Germany. From November 30 to December 12, the 28th edition was held in Dubai, United Arab Emirates. The main objective of COP28 was to draw up the first Global Stocktake, or inventory and results of the commitments made by countries in Paris at COP21 in 2015.

A DIGITAL GUIDE TO THE BIODIVERSITY OF SAINT BARTH

Karl Questel, a project manager at the Territorial Environmental Agency (ATE), has created a digital guide to the biodiversity of Saint Barthélemy. A publication that comprises thousands of photographs taken by the author over the past 20 years.

Karl Questel has completed a colossal task. To create his digital guide to the island's biodiversity, he was a keen observer of all he could see through his camera's lens. That means several thousand images that he sorted, classified, captioned. The result is a remarkable online publication—an e-book—published by the ATE, where Questel is one of the top project managers for terrestrial flora and fauna.

With a total of 3.429 photographs, the publication can be downloaded free of charge. "This represents all of the flora and fauna of Saint Barth that I was able to photograph for the past 20 years," says Questel with a smile. He also explains up front that this is but a first edition of the guide. "It will be updated whenever there are new additions," he notes. As a result, his work will be in a state of perpetual evolution.

More than 2,100 Species, Families, Genuses...

The thousands of photographs represent more than 2,100 illustrated taxa (that is to say taxonomic unities: the family, the genus, the species), including 1,602 animals and 545 plants, mushrooms, algae,

and other examples. "It's the kind of guide where you must look carefully," says the author with modesty, as he continues the battle to properly organize the many species. "I classified the plants by physical categories and visual characteristics, with sub categories," he explains, finding that provided the simplest clarity. However, in perusing the guide, it is easy to see how quickly one can go down a rabbit hole.

The guide also allows room for species discovered in Saint Barth that have not yet been formally identified. This makes it a tool to learn about known species but also to advance in identifying the unknown.

On the homepage of the guide, visitors will find a questionnaire. Easy to fill out and which allows them, if they so desire, to be alerted as to the exact time of future updates to the guide, which can be down-

loaded on a computer but also on a smartphone. One must have the space for size of the guide, because, as the author points out: "There are 574 pages and there will be even more in the next edition!"

This guide with its scientific ambitions may still have room for improvement, such as adding more precise characteristics, for example. But in version 1.2, this photo-guide has already established itself as the bible for biodiversity in Saint Barthélemy. And it's great to know that new chapters will continue to be added to this sacred manuscript.
