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Restoration Of Small Salt Pond in Grand-Cul-de-Sac



here is a generation of Saint Barth many of whom were instrumental in making the island what it is today. A generation that is fading away, and one can only hope we can honor their legacy. Imagine being born on the island of Saint Barthélemy 80 or more years ago. There were no roads, mainly goat paths. There was no electricity, no running water, no cars, no airplanes until Remy de Haenan landed here in 1946. If you were sick, they took you off the island by boat. There was one midwife who used a horse or donkey to get from one side of the island to the other, especially if two babies were being born the same day in different neighborhoods. The kids, sometimes as many as a dozen in one family, were all born at home, in small cottages where they slept in hammocks, and mama cooked outside over an open fire. Clothes were often made from old flour sacks and kids walked barefoot to school. Everyone was poor but not unhappy. One of the men from that era, Raymond Magras, passed away this weekend at the age of 84. I can only imagine what his early life was like, but as part of a leading family of merchants, with various branches that would eventually create the shops of ALMA (Raymond's father was "Old Alma" or Alexander Magras), GDM, and CCPF, he made his mark, importing things that would improve the quality of life of the island. Raymond was a man who gave to others with his heart and soul, and was a founding member of FEMUR, the organization that raises funds for the local hospital, and of the Lions Club. He was often heard playing the accordion, a traditional island instrument. As a lone bagpiper plays for a Scottish funeral, I

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Tourist In Fatal Quad Accident

A n accident took place in the early afternoon of Friday, January 19, by the entry to the path that leads from La Petite Anse (Flamands) to the beach in Colombier. A couple of Canadian tourists in their sixties lost control of their quad. The reason has yet to be determined as to why the quad left the path (most likely a false maneuver), causing the two victims to fall several meters before crashing onto the rocks.

When the rescue team arrived at the site of the accident (firemen, emergency medical team, gendarmerie, and territorial police), they confirmed the death of the woman. At the same time, initial examinations of the man, who was alive but seriously injured, showed that his vital signs were seriously compromised. The Civil Security Dragon helicopter was called to transport the injured



man to Guadeloupe.

By the time the helicopter arrived shortly after 5pm, the medical team had managed to stabilize the injured man's condition. After a few maneuvers by the pilot over the waters of La Petite Anse, the rescue team managed to hoist the injured man into the helicopter.

The accident is said to have occurred during a quad tour involving a group of cruise ship passengers who were aboard the Sea Cloud 2, which was calling at Saint Barthélemy for the day.



Northern Island Gendarmerie Gains Autonomy

aturday, January 13, 2024 is a date that will go down in history for the Northern Islands gendarmerie. At a ceremony organized with great pomp and ceremony at Saint Martin's Babit Point, lieutenant general Lionel Lavergne made it official: the creation of an autonomous command for the Northern Islands Gendarmerie, handing over this responsibility to colonel Maxime Wintzer-Wehekind. Going forward, the gendarmerie of Saint Barthélemy and Saint Martin is completely detached from Guadeloupe. A major change, as confirmed by Vincent Berton, deputy prefect for the Northern Islands.

"This is an important event," confirms Vincent Breton, as representative of the French government. "It concretely marks the first step toward a full-fledged prefecture for the Northern

Islands." General Lavergne details the implications of this change in command: "Firstly, on January 2, the superior hierarchy changed," explains the four-star officer. "It is now me rather than general Vincent Lamballe. In operational terms, the Com Gend has autonomy in the day-to-day running of its operations. In terms of human resources as well. Gendarmes assigned to the Northern Islands will no longer also be assigned to Guadeloupe. From a budgetary point of view, needs and requests will come directly from the colonel. These are very important changes. They reflect putting the two territories into proper perspective."

This autonomy should also bring an increase in gendarmes, both in

"We have three main priorities," explains deputy prefect Vincent Berton. "Road safety, the fight against drugs, and intentional personal injury. We have noted a sharp increase in this type of crime on Saint Barthélemy, which is a real concern, as it reflects a deterioration in the quality of life."

This autonomy of the gendarmerie is also an important first step toward the creation of a separate prefecture for the Northern Islands. A commitment made by Gérald Darmanin, Minister of the Interior and Overseas France.

Permit Approved For Grand-Cul-de-Sac Salt Pond Restoration



The Collectivity's executive council voted favorably on November 30, 2023 to approve a permit for the restoration of the small salt pond in Grand-Cul-de-Sac, which had been submitted on September 27. Only Romaric Magras and Alexandra Questel, members of the opposition, Saint-Barth d'Abord, voted against. Several modifications to the initial project were required of group requesting the permit (Société Civile of Petit Etang and Société Civile of Grand-Cul-de-Sac) to get the executive council's approval. The salt ponds and adjoining land was purchased in 2021 by Dimitri Pilitsis, an American citizen born in Saint Martin. Since 2018, he has participated financially in various studies and analyses on the evolution of the flora, fauna, water, and soil. The initial project, part real estate, has evolved into a restoration of the natural site. The

owner intends to clean up the site, replant and restore the mangroves and beach habitat. He also wants to establish a clean, modern communication link between the two parts of the pond, and restore the natural configuration of the land through the growth of mangroves. Each stage of the project will be closely monitored by the Territorial Environmental Agency.

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Carnival 2024 in the Starting Blocks !

Less than three weeks before Mardi Gras 2024 and the St Barth Carnival celebration, nine floats are ready to roll through the streets of Gustavia on Tuesday, February 13, 2024. Safety is a priority for the huge crowd that attends.

t 2pm on Tuesday, February 13, nine Carnival floats will start their Mardi Gras parade, with Vaval, the Carnival King, leading the way. A parade that promises to the colorful and lively, featuring Latin dancers from Ti Ouana Salsa, Carnival groups Cho Douvan from ASCCO and The Youngz, talented dancers from the Golden Team and the Caribbean Girls, plus Tet Ansanm representing Haitian culture, local musicians from N.I.B (North Islands Band) and, last but not least, the Dreamers. Also present with their float, the dancers from SBH Pineapple Girls, celebrating their 10th anniversary, and presenting a pre-Carnival event on Saturday, February 3. Detailed information about this event can be found on Instagram at pineapple girls sbh. One float that will be missed is that of Nikki Beach, which has been popular over the years.

Leaving from the Commercial Dock in Public, the parade follows its traditional route through the streets of Gustavia throughout the afternoon, dancing its way around La Pointe and eventually back to Public. During the parade, fiveminute choreographed performances will be seen as the floats stop in front of the pharmacy, the Cours Vendôme, Rue de la République, the Pif Paf kiosk, and close to the La Poste.

All access roads to Gustavia will be closed as of 1pm, with free shuttles running between the parking lot in Saint Jean and the Commercial Dock from 1pm to 9pm. "The crowd for Carnival in Saint Barthélemy gets bigger from year to year. Since our desire is for this



day to remain a festive and fun time for everyone, this year we have better organization, and above all, great support from the Collectivity, the police, and the fire department," emphasizes Jocari Bapin, president of the Carnival Committee. No fewer than twenty security agents will be mobilized for the event, with each float benefiting from a dedicated person in permanent contact with the police and fire department.

As a prelude to Carnival 2024, the little ones will kick off the festivities with the Kid's Carnival parading through the streets of Gustavia on Friday, February 9, starting at 3pm at the Quai du Général de Gaulle. Each school will present a different theme, such as that of environmental protection for Ecole Sainte Marie in Colombier.

The next day, Saturday, February 10, it's time for the Association Bout d'Chou, uniting some of the island's daycare workers, small children, and their parents. The young Carnival revelers will start their circus-themed parade at 4:30pm. The time to meet is 4:15pm on the Quai du Général de

Gaulle, where a bar will provide refreshments before the parade, which will snake along the waterfront, back up the Rue de la Paix, and continue as far as ALMA, before going back to the dock where there will be music and a snack bar until 7pm.

The Lighting Parade is the next event, with island musicians parading on Saturday, February 10 from 7pm to 10pm, leaving Public, with a truck distributing light-up accessories to get everyone into a party mood three days before Mardi Gras.

As is traditional, the burning of Vaval will close the festivities on Wednesday, February 14, Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day. Throughout the day, the effigy of the Carnival King will be in front of Le Select in Gustavia. A perfect time for selfies!

Then at 7pm, a cortege will leave Le Select in the direction of Shell Beach where, somewhere after 8:30pm, with security barriers in place on the beach, Vaval will be consumed by flames.

St Barth Music Festival: Changing Of The Guard

• moothly, that's how I'd say the new organizing committee of the St Barth Music Festival, led by its president Corinne Hennequin, and its new artistic committee, handled taking over the reins of a 40-year-old cultural event and making it new while respecting the old. Founded by American violinist Frances DeBroff, who ran the festival for the first 39 years, this year marked its 40th anniversary and a changing of the guard. From extensive pre-publicity, an online ticketing system, and a lovey program book of 50+ pages to a mix of returning and new musicians, two new conductors, an operatic concert version of "Carmen" and a Creole jazz group to close the festival, the event maintained its standards of excellence and musical showmanship. The stellar artistic committee consisted of Jennifer Frautschi, Francis Gouton, Nitzan Haroz, Alecia Lawyer, Brain Lewis, and Jon Manasse (who played clarinet with his talented son Alec), and their input on musical selections and additions to the orchestra were right on point. The two new musicians I met personally are Bernie Scully, French horn, and Amy Taylor, flute, and they both fell in love with the festival and the island. There's nothing like being sur-



rounded by your musical peers coupled with the beauty of the island and the charm of playing in old churches that happen to have wonderful acoustics. The sold-out audiences attest to the success of this 40th anniversary, which concluded with two performances by AKODA, a jazz trio led by singer/keyboard player Valérie Chane Tef, who brings a touch of Creole culture from her native Reunion Island to mix with the Creole culture of the French West Indies in a lively repertory that had the audience clapping their hands, tapping their feet, and even dancing in front of the pews at the Anglican Church as the festival came to a close.
